# CIRCUIT COURT CONVENES MONDAY

Lyda Case to be Taken up by Jury First Case on Docket COURT DECIDES ORDINANCE FAULTY Says Falls to Provide Hearing Where Dogs are to be Killed

Judge Bagley will open court Monday morning with the jurors in attendance. The first case on the docket will be the Lyda case, a statutory charge, tried months ago, and resulting in disagreement. This will take several days.

The Court has handed down an opinion which declares void the Hillsboro dog ordinance, and Judge Bagley quotes the Supreme Court in a Salem case. The crux of the decision is that the constitution says one's property can not be taken away without due process of law. The case arose out of the chief of police taking a canine belonging to T. H. Tongue Jr. The ordinance provides for no hearing, but says that the officer shall take the animal and kill it if the penalty is not paid.

Judge Benson, of the Supreme Court, wrote the opinion which Judge Bagley followed in deciding the case. It is expected that the jury will be in the county seat several days, as several cases have been set for trial.
