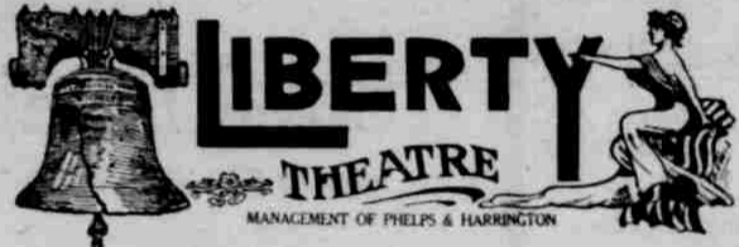

Ben Anderson, Plaintiff, vs. Laura A. Caples and R. A. Caples, her husband, W. M. Nelson, J. Chris O'Day and A. Welch, Defendants. To R. A. Caples and W. M. Nelson, of the above named defendants: In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby commanded and required to appear and answer the amended complaint of the plaintiff filed against you in the above entitled Court and cause on or before the 10th day of June, 1916, said date being after the expiration of six weeks from the date of the publication of this summons, and if you fail so to appear and answer said amended complaint for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for and demanded in his amended complaint, to-wit: For a judgment against the defendant, Laura A.
