Sheep are beginning to move a little more freely, although the receipts were only 300 head. All classes are in great demand and top prices are still being realized.

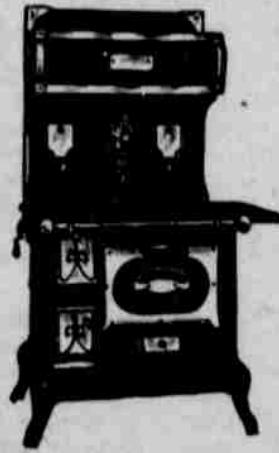
