HIGH-CLASS CONCERT

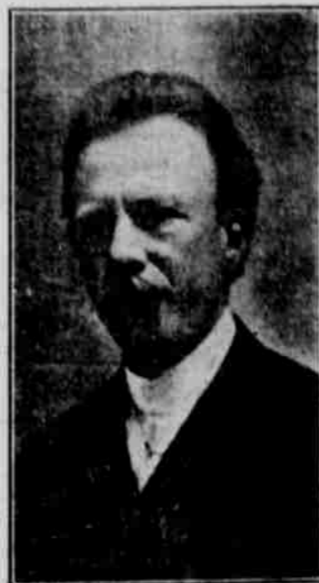

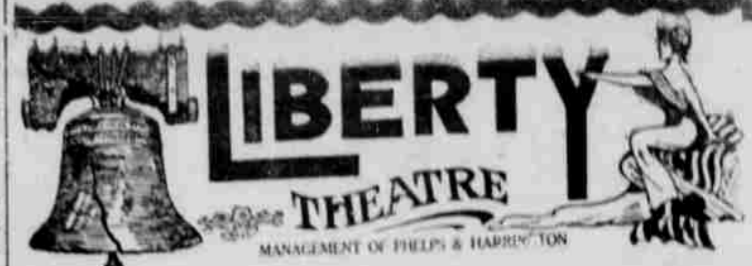
