

# DUAL ACCIDENT AT JOHN M. WALL HOME

Three Year Old Son Loses End of Finger, Monday

LITTLE GIRL FALLS SAME EVENING

Takes Drop Out of Catalpa Tree and is Rendered Unconscious

The John M. Wall home was the scene of two accidents, Monday afternoon, causing some little distress. Allen, the three-year-old son, while playing with the lawn mower, cut off the end of a little finger, and Dr. Robb was obliged to amputate at the first joint. After the little had been quieted a few hours, the little sister, Evelyn, fell from a catalpa tree, a distance of 15 or 20 feet, being rendered unconscious, and sustaining more or less internal injuries. She and little Doris Applegate, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Applegate, were playing in the big flowering tree near the garage, and were on a limb, which broke, precipitating the little Wall girl to the ground. The Applegate child clung to the limb and screamed for aid. Paul and Bruce Bailey procured a ladder and assisted her to terra firma. Dr. Robb attended the injuries of the little girl, and she is resting easy, although very tender from the fall.

The Bailey cousins had quite a time rescuing the Applegate child from her perilous position, it being necessary to hold the ladder straight in the air. Mr. Wall has now had three accidents, one after the other. On Sunday, while in Portland, his auto was crashed into by a Mr. Sauvie, and the fender and running board stripped from the Wall machine. Mr. Wall was on the right side of the street and Sauvie will have to pay the damage. The third time is the "charm" and Wall now thinks there will be no more accidents for a century.

# NOVEL CELEBRATION FOR COUNTY SEAT

Exercises Begin on Sunday P. M. When 70 Bandsmen Play at Park

Big Parade of Nations at 10, Monday Morning—Miss Anna Berge, Goddess

The various committees have worked faithfully to give Hillsboro one of the best celebrations from the standpoint of interesting features that the city has ever known. On Sunday, at 2 p. m. the first feature will be scheduled—a band concert of 70 pieces in the city park, and a baseball game between the Banks and Vita Clubs.

On the morning of the 3rd, at ten, the big parade, representing the different Nations going to make up the citizenship of our country, takes place. This promise to be unique and educational. There will be baseball at the grounds between Laurel and Verboort, and dancing at the pavilion afternoon and evening.

At sunrise on July 4, J. C. Lamkin and J. T. Young will fire a National salute of 13 guns. The Automobile and Industrial parade will start from Main Street at ten, and after reaching the ground Gov. Withycombe will deliver the patriotic address. In the afternoon Cornelius and the Vita Club will contend for honors in the national game.

There will be athletic events, races, sports-of-war, and many other sporting contests, prizes for which are given in another place in this issue. In the morning's parade Columbia, and the Goddess of Liberty will be impersonated by Miss Anna Berge. The evening will close with the usual splendid display of fireworks, without which no celebration can be a success. Hillsboro has ever given the visitors a fine pyrotechnic display and this will be no exception.

# WILL OF PIONEER R. H. WALKER FILED

Two Instruments Filed in Probate, to Probate in Conjunction

WIDOW AND DAUGHTER BENEFICIARIES

Instrument States Not Unmindful of Sons, Has Helped Heretofore

Two wills, one signed in April, 1913, and one in May, 1914, by R. H. Walker, of near Beaver, were filed in probate, yesterday, with the petition asking that both be probated one in conjunction with the other.

The 1913 will gave the estate to the wife, Rachel Walker, after giving \$1 to each of the two sons and daughter. It also provided that Laura Walker and W. B. Walker would get the estate, share and share, in case Mrs. Walker passed before the pioneer.

The 1914 will gives Laura Walker Olds, the only surviving daughter, the home place of 125 acres, subject to a life estate of the mother, and they are to share the income of the estate. The residue of the estate goes to the widow. It mentions the sons, and says that material and financial help has been given them in lieu of legacy.

The 1914 instrument asks that Mrs. Walker and the daughter act as executrix without bonds, but the petition to probate was signed by the daughter, asking that the mother alone act as executrix.

It also provides that in case the daughter should pass without issue, the five children of A. A. Walker, son, should be amply cared for.

E. B. Tongue filed the papers for a Portland attorney. The estate is popularly supposed to be one of the largest ever filed in Court here.
