#### INFANTILE PARALYSIS

Dr. Lucas, Osgood and Rosenau, all physicians of high standing in Boston have made valuable reports on the disease commonly known as infantile paralysis. In prevalence in the East.

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Physicians generally are getting more and more to take this attitude.

From the reports given by these men, and largely endorsed by the medical profession, it is generally concluded that—

1. Most domestic animals are afflicted with different forms of paralysis. Cats, dogs, pigs, and chickens, etc., are frequently subjects of diseases that paralyze. Monkeys have been diseased from children suffering with infantile paralysis (experimental) and died with all the symptoms of the children so afflicted.

2. Flies may carry the disease on their bodies from one place to another. It occurs from the very slightest indisposition to the most severe and fatal forms.

3. Paralysis and the dwarfing of limbs and muscles is the common result with those who recover.

4. In all afflicted, the nose and throat are inflamed and from a bad cold to a severe inflammation of the entire nasal and throat passage the disease presents a deceptive appearance. From the preceding statements it follows that the following rules are very good.

1st. During the months of the summer, use as a routine practice a mouth and throat wash of some good antiseptic. There are many that are commonly known and most of them are good.

2nd. Avoid contact (this is for children under 10 years of age) with cats, chickens and dogs. Animals with discharges from throat and nose or developing paralysis should be destroyed.

3rd. If these suggestions do not help the simple cold or severe fever ensues, call a physician.
