## GOSSMAN LANGUISHES IN JAIL, DEFAULT BAIL

Court Fixes Bond at Six Thousand Dollars on Larceny Indictment

CRIPPLED CAPITALIST HAS TROUBLE

North Plains Friends Invited to go on Surety Bond Object

R. C. Gossman, who recently paid the \$2,500 cash fine in circuit court is still languishing in jail on the indictments charging him with arson and with assault and battery, the object of his wrath being his wife. The court heard Gossman's plea of not guilty last Friday, and fixed the bond for appearance at \$6,000. In default of bail, Gossman was taken back to his cell, and he is now very bitter at being deprived of his liberty.

Six thousand dollars is some bond, and when Gossman tried to get some North Plains people to go bail he found that the friend in need was a rare avis.

Mrs. Gossman was over the last of the week endeavoring to get his bond fixed, but her efforts were fruitless.

Just how much of a case the state has against Gossman is known only by the grand jury which indicted, and District Attorney Tongue, who presented the evidence. Mr. Tongue evidently considers he has a good case, for he ordinarily uses great care in presenting indictments.

Gossman's trial on the arson charge will probably take place in September, after the Bennett Thompson case is out of the way.

Mrs. Gossman, who it is alleged was assaulted by her husband, was scratched up a little, but her injuries were minor. It is understood that she is expected to "stand pat" so far as prosecution is concerned, but as there is other evidence the state feels that it has a good case.
