# WELL KNOWN EDUCATOR DIES HERE THIS WEEK

Prof. M. C. Case Passes at Home; After Many Months' Illness

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT FOR YEARS

Also Principal of Hillsboro and Other County Schools

Prof. M. C. Case, a well known county teacher and educator, died at the family home on Sixth Street, at 6:30 o'clock, Tuesday evening, August 8, 1916, after many months of illness. His ailment was heart trouble, augmented by Bright's disease.

Mr. Case taught many years in Washington County, and for three years was superintendent of the Hillsboro public schools. He was also school superintendent of Washington County for two terms.

Melvin Cyrus Case was born in Monroe Co., Michigan, April 14, 1859, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Case. After finishing high school he attended two terms at the Michigan Agricultural College, at Lansing, Mich., and then graduated out of the State Normal, at Ypsilanti. He taught 12 years in the Ypsilanti schools, and in July, 1892, came to Oregon. On June 25, 1896, he was married to Miss Josephine Shearer, of above Forest Grove. Besides teaching at Hillsboro, Beaverton, Diley, Cornelius, Centerville, and other points in this county, he taught also at St. Helens. He belonged to the St. Helens lodge of Masons, and the Glencoe lodge of Knights of Pythias.

His widow and two daughters, Mattie and Clara Case, survive, and a son by his first wife—Raymond A. Case, lives at Los Angeles.

The funeral took place this afternoon, at 1:30, at the residence, Rev. Myers and Rev. Smith conducting the services.

Interment was in the cemetery at Hillside, north of Forest Grove.
