Circumstantial evidence has been given a black eye many times, and yet there are cases where it is as good as that of eye witnesses. This was the case in the Jennings murder. Bennett Thompson was convicted by three shirts, two of them being important and conclusive proofs of guilt. The bloody shirt found at the scene of the crime, in itself, was not sufficient. But when Sheriff Reeves, after Portland officials had made all search deemed necessary, found the twin shirt to that found at the crime, and in so doing traced the two outer shirts to Bennett Thompson beyond peradventure of doubt, it spelled conviction. Without this evidence Thompson would have been at liberty—never would have been indicted. Mrs. Clark's evidence was such as to preclude any possibility of "frame-up," and Thompson will expiate the crime, and justly so. Sheriff Reeves and District Attorney Tongue are entitled to fullest credit for their persistent and clever work on this case, and the more so because their teamwork was so complete that justice did not go astray.

Geo. E. Payne, of Sheridan, and Alice C. Duley, of Tualatin, were granted a marriage license, Monday.

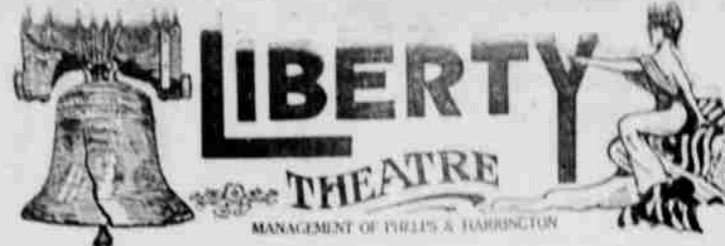
German Lutheran services next Sunday afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock, at the Congregational church.—E. W. Luecke, pastor.

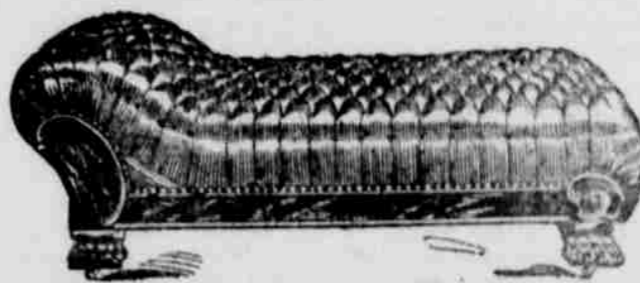
