W. N. Harris has built a new hood and front porch on his auto "bug," and it is now more than pleasing to the eye. Doc Yak has nothing over Bill.

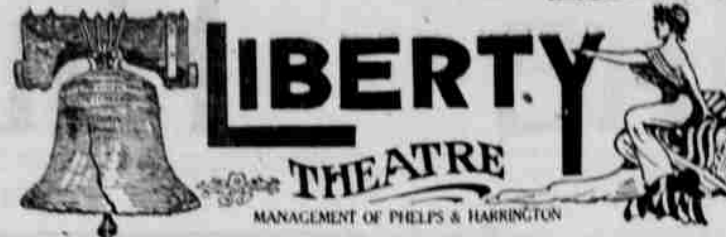
