Sale Took Place at Tillamook Recently, For Cash S. P. R. R. COMPANY SPENDS MONEY Oregon Prune Crop, "We'uns" Helping, Worth Three Million

The closing year has been the best in Oregon history as to business. A review of the State follows: The S. P. R. R. Co. has spent in Oregon during the present year on new lines and equipment \$1,913,939; on old lines and equipment \$630,887 on stations, shops and roundhouses, \$29,069.
