FOR THE BOND BILL

Pass Resolution Favoring Affirm-
ative by Vote of 27 to 18

THE BODY ASKS FOR PUBLICITY
Will Publish in Grange Bulletin and
Local Papers

The following resolution was
adopted at the regular session of
Beaverton Grange, April 14, by
a vote of 27 for and 18 opposed:
Whereas, House Bill No. 550,
of the last Oregon Legislative
session, providing for a \$6,000,-
000 State Bond issue, for road
purposes, has been referred to
the people, to decide either for
or against such bond issue, at a
special election to be held in the
State of Oregon, June 4th, next,
and

Whereas, reliable information
has been furnished to satisfy the
voters of the state, that the li-
cense fees of automobiles, auto-
trucks and other gasoline prop-
elled vehicles, together with
the one-quarter mill general road
tax will more than pay the
bonds, during the life of said
bonds, as well as the interest
thereon, and

Whereas, we, citizens of the
State, believing in progress and
public improvement, beneficial to
the whole State of Oregon, and
especially to those who bear the
burden of this proposed legisla-
tion and

Whereas, we fully appreciate
the fact that centralization of
capital will accomplish more
good than money received in
small amounts as heretofore, in
constructing our public high
ways, now therefore be it

Resolved, that we, Beaverton
Grange No. 324, of Beaverton,
Washington County, State of
Oregon, endorse the action of
the last Oregon legislature in
passing this proposed measure
and urge all friends of good roads
in the State of Oregon to vote to
confirm the action of said legisla-
ture in passing this proposed
measure, and urge all friends of
good roads in the State of Ore-
gon to vote to confirm the action
of said legislature to the end
that this become a law of our
state.

United States Scout Cruiser Chester

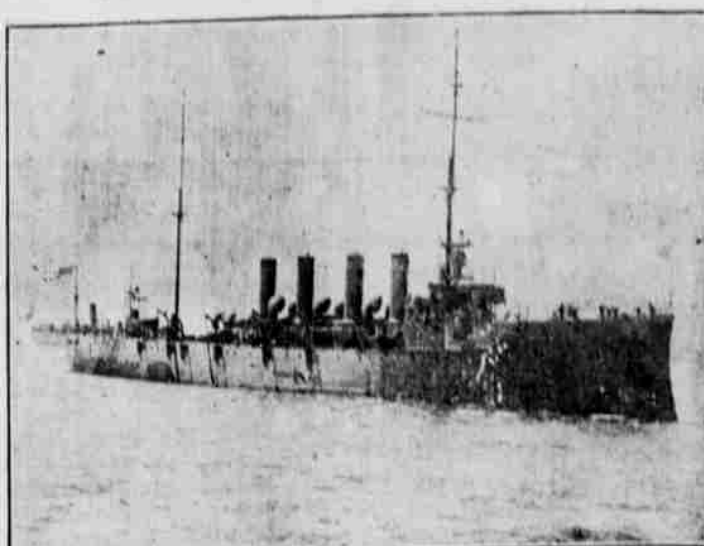

With a speed of twenty six knots an hour the Chester is the fastest cruiser
in the United States navy. She has a displacement of 3,750 tons, and her guns
consist of two five-inch and six three-inch. She was built at the cost of \$1,686,
674 and has 356 officers and men.

United States Battleship New Jersey

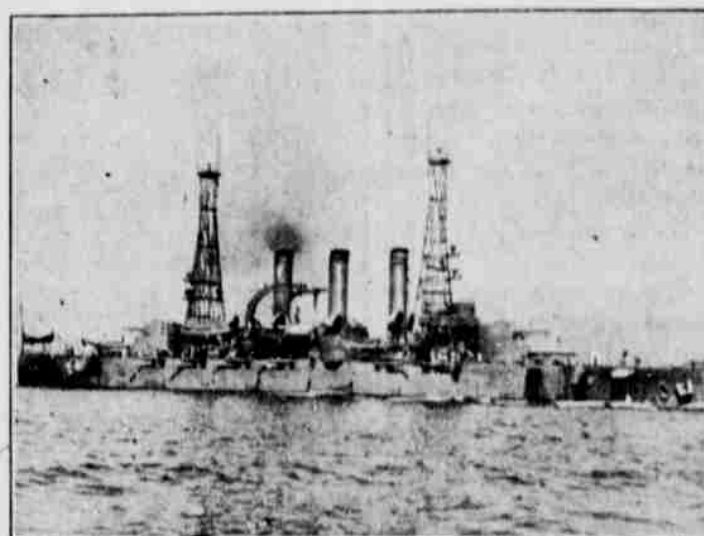

The New Jersey is of the "B" type of battleship and displaces 14,948 tons,
being 441 feet long. In her main battery she carries four twelve-inch and
eight eight-inch guns. Her complement is 812 officers and men.

United States Battleship Rhode Island

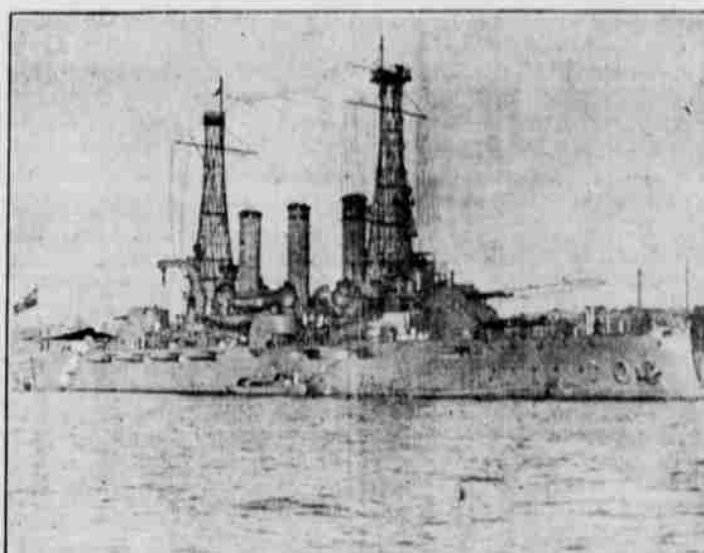

The Rhode Island is 441 feet long, with a displacement of 14,984 tons. She
has four twelve-inch and eight eight-inch guns. Her keel was laid in 1902,
and she has a crew of 812.

United States Super-Dreadnought Arkansas

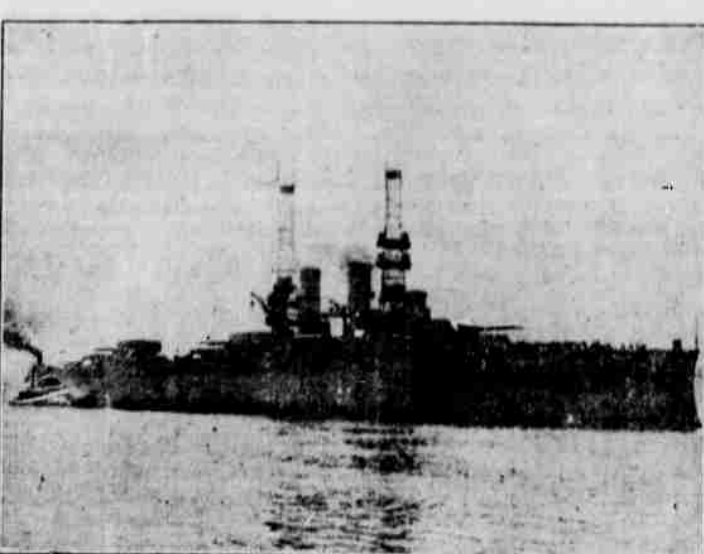

The Arkansas is a 20,000 ton vessel, 562 feet long. She carries twelve
twelve-inch guns, and it takes 1,943 officers and men to run her.

United States Battleship Kansas

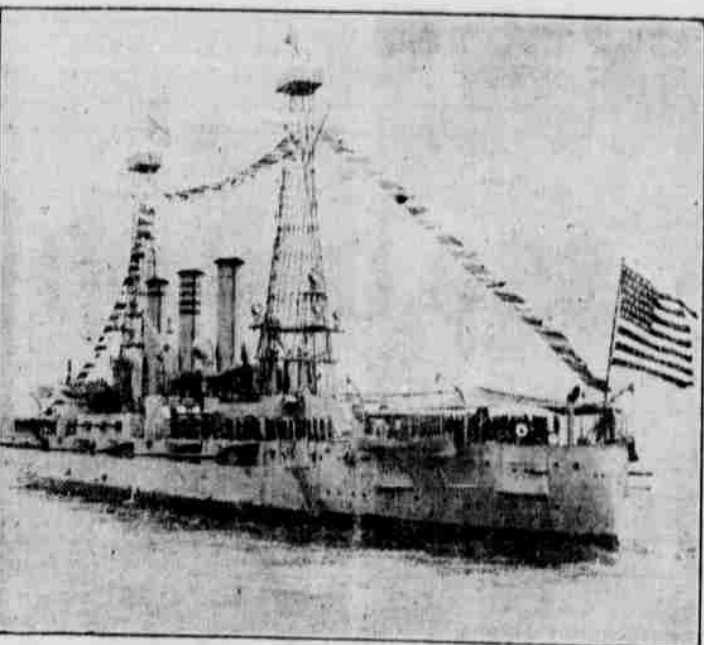

The battleship Kansas has a complement of 850 officers and men. As her
main battery she carries four twelve-inch and eight eight-inch guns and dis-
places 16,000 tons. She cost \$7,565,520 to build.
