PRACTICAL HEALTH HINT.

Open the Windows. Statistics show that the death rate for pneumonia, bronchitis, colds and grip is highest in January, February and March. These are the window shut months. The rate is lowest in July, August and September, when the windows are wide open. The rate rises again in October, November and December, when the windows are closing. It does not drop again until April, May and June, when the windows are again opening. The death rate for the four diseases in winter cannot be reduced to that prevailing in summer, but it can be materially lessened by a more general use of fresh air. No air that ever blew out of doors is as dangerous or so poisonous as that inside a bedroom with tightly closed windows. Night air is just as pure and as wholesome as day air. Fogs and rains are only injurious in so far as they frighten you into closing your windows. Open the windows and lower the death rate.
