SENATOR CHAMBERLAIN

Senator Chamberlain yesterday
endorsed the road bond bill in
following language:

"I can not leave Oregon with-
out emphatically expressing my
profound interest in the road
bond issue which is to come be-
fore the people next Monday.

"I believe in good roads. I
always have, but now, with the
country at war, we must provide
ourselves with every possible
facility for carrying on the war
successfully.

"Money judiciously spent for
roads is not squandered. It is
not wasted. A good road is a
good investment. The farmer
should remember that a good
road between his place and his
market reduces his cost of trans-
portation. This reduction will
more than meet the cost of the
road.

"There is nothing in the line
of preparedness in which the
Government is so vitally concern-
ed as good roads—hard-surface
roads. We will need them for
military purposes, we need them
more effectively to move the
products of the farms to market.
The people of this state will be
performing a great patriotic duty
if they carry the road bond issue
overwhelmingly.

"The proposition for the auto-
mobiles, that help destroy roads,
to pay for them, is certainly in
the right direction.

"Durable, dependable roads
that can be used in every season
are an absolute military neces-
sity, in addition to the advantages
that they afford as commercial,
marketing and tourist highways.
