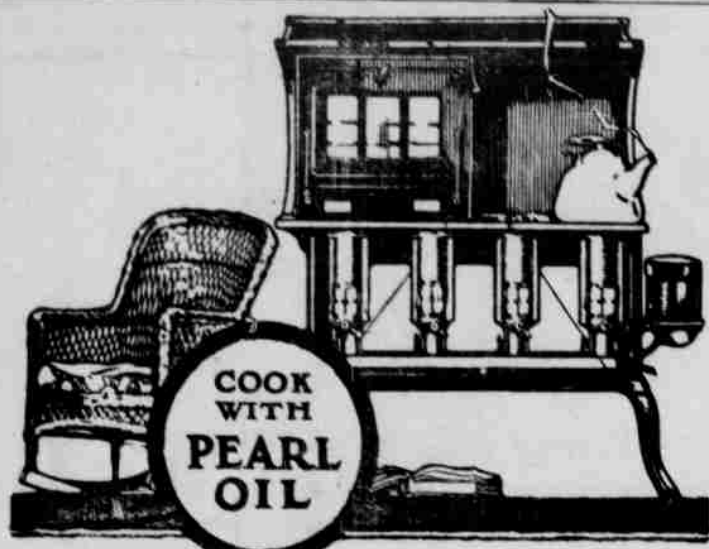

### AIMING A BIG GUN.

A Task in Which Figure Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics.

Today there is about as much difference between aiming a big gun and aiming a rifle as there is between sailing a superdreadnaught and sailing a steam yacht. It was not very long ago, however, that a gun was aimed similarly to a rifle in that the direction in which it was pointed was obtained by sighting along its barrel.

But now things are not done that way. The gunners are often far out of sight of what they are shooting at, and the remarkable hits that they make are only explained by the use they make of careful scientific calculations.

To direct the fire of one of the bigger guns, for example, requires that no less than fifteen complicated corrections be made, says Popular Science Monthly. Each correction requires an average of five adjustments, all of which must first be exactly figured out by those in command. The most important corrections which are made are for the influence of the resistance of the air, the influence of the earth's curvature and the attraction of gravity on the distance the bullet may be carried.

In place of the guesswork of previous times is the use of the most advanced developments in the fields of mathematics, physics and chemistry.

### HAITI CLEANS HOUSE.

Changes That Were Brought About by the American Occupation.

Five years ago in Haiti there was on the whole island not more than one mile of macadamized roadway, and the new streets, taking the place of combination trails and sewers, are the most noticeable changes brought about by the American occupation.

But more remarkable than the streets is the astonishing sight of squads of Haitians actually cleaning the streets. Under the old regime the chief occupations of the male citizens of Haiti were cockfighting and politics.

The refuse and smells have departed, and, better still, most of the children have disappeared from the streets. They are actually at school, where by Haitian law they are supposed to be, but where by Haitian lawlessness only about 10 per cent of them ever used to be.

About 4 o'clock every week day you will see this newly mobilized infantry coming home in squads clean and, unfortunately for the picturesque value of Haitian highways and byways, now thoroughly provided with clothes.—World's Work.

### TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYERS.

They Are Unarmored and Are Helpless Against Gunfire.

Every one is familiar, of course, with the ordinary torpedo boat, a swift vessel of from 400 to 600 tons in displacement, carrying no defensive armor, but armed with tubes for discharging the deadly torpedoes.

To counteract these weapons of the sea, according to the Popular Science Monthly, a type of vessel was designed of about double the size of torpedo boats, a little greater speed and in addition to torpedo tubes armed with rapid fire six to twelve pound guns, for the avowed purpose of destroying torpedo boats. Laterally all the great nations have stopped building torpedo boats as originally designated and are building torpedo boat destroyers.

Recent engagements have developed the fact that torpedo boat destroyers are used almost wholly as torpedo boats. So they are really battleship destroyers. To defend the capital ships from torpedo attack the dreadnaughts and battle cruisers are armed with secondary batteries of rapid fire guns from four to six inches in diameter. One well placed shell from a gun of that size will ordinarily put a destroyer out of business, as the destroyers have no defensive armor whatever.

### CZAR AND KAISER.

Both Titles Mean the Same and Are Derived From Caesar.

It seems strange that two words so different in sound and spelling as czar and kaiser are the same. Both are but changes made in the course of nearly 2000 years in the word caesar. All the Roman emperors took their title from the first emperor—our old friend of schoolboy days—Julius Caesar. When Charlemagne founded the holy Roman empire and was crowned emperor, he took the name caesar or, in the frankish form, kaiser. In the modern German empire was established in 1871 the German emperor, William I., grandfather of the present kaiser, took the same title—kaiser.

Similarly the rulers of the eastern empire at Constantinople, successors to the old Roman empire, called themselves caesar. Every petty chieftain or prince in the territory surrounding the eastern empire copied the custom and called himself caesar or czar. In the course of time, however, the greatest of these, the czar of Muscovy, conquered the other czars until he was the sole or practically the sole ruler called czar. However, the king of Bulgaria, when a few years ago he had himself crowned as king, took the title of czar.—Pittsburgh Dispatch.

## Returning the Battleflags

ON a number of occasions the newspapers have announced the return to the survivors of the Confederacy of flags which were captured during the war between the states. The passing of more than fifty years since the close of that tremendous struggle has quenched the animosities which it had engendered, and the people of the north have many times stretched forth a fraternal hand to the people of the south. The hand has been grasped in the same spirit in which it was extended, but there have been rather few instances where captured northern flags have been returned to the survivors of the Union cause.

Now comes an inspiring illustration of the growth of this spirit of fraternity on the part of the boys who wore the gray. Recent dispatches announced the return of the battle flag of the Seventy-sixth Ohio Volunteer Infantry, which was captured in a sanguinary engagement at Ringold Gap, Ga. The Ohio regiment held its annual reunion at Newark, and one of the pleasing features of the occasion was the presentation to the regiment of the captured flag.

There is not an American worthy of the name who will not feel a warmer thrill of Americanism as he hears of such instances as this, which set a new seal upon the reunion of the once divided sections. The bitterness which was aroused by the action of President Cleveland when his first official act was an attempt to return to the ex-Confederates some captured battle flags has long since died away. That was thirty-two years ago, a generation of human life, and opinions have undergone a most gratifying change during those years. There is no dishonor in these exchanges of fraternal amenities, which should go on until the last vestige of sectional feeling has been wiped out. The time must come when there will be no more "trifles" of the victory of one section of Americans over another.

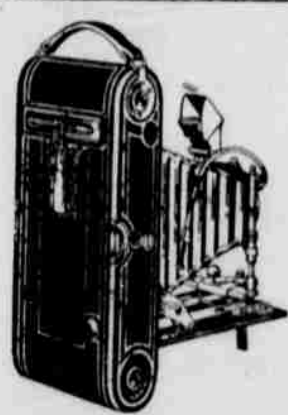
