

OWEN DENNY'S WIDOW IN DIRE EXTREMY

Fund Stared to Save Elderly Woman's Home in Her 80th Year

PAY IN TO CASHIER DAVID KURATLI

Of the Hillsboro National, Who Will Forward Funds

Dr. Earl McFarland, President of the Oregon Sportsmen's League, writes the Argus as follows:

To The Sportsmen of Oregon—

"Dear Sportsmen:

As the President of the Oregon Sportsmen's League my attention has been called to the fact that the widow of the Honorable Owen N. Denny, who was the first man that shipped the Chinese game birds to America in November, 1882, is now living in this city and she is in need of funds to save her home.

You will remember, good sportsmen, that Judge Denny was a very able and honorable man and he has given to us a great gift well to be remembered. Since his death in the year 1900 his wife, Mrs. Gertrude Denny, was left with a home, and about four years ago believing that she could receive an income if she could mortgage her home for six thousand dollars. She did so, but the investment was a failure. During the past four years she has labored faithfully to pay the interest on this mortgage by selling her rooms, furniture, and taking roomers in her home, and now, in her 80th year, with about \$4000 contracted debt, she is about to lose her home. I have been able to have the mortgage withheld the foreclosure for a while, so please hurry this matter.

I fully believe that the Sportsmen of America will contribute \$1 or more each, and that the sum of \$10,000 will be raised to clear this mortgage and indebtedness as a living monument to the memory of Judge Denny and for the protection of his faithful and honorable wife. Therefore, I appeal to you as loyal sportsmen to immediately communicate with me about the matter as Portland began last week to raise her share.

I am mailing the various Leagues of the State full particulars, enclosing subscription blanks, etc., hoping for their full co-operation in this very worthy cause.

EIGHT NEW CITIZENS ADMITTED BY COURT

Two Women Given Their Papers Both Answering All Questions

SEVEN APPLICANTS FAIL TO PASS

New Examiner, Mr. Tyler, Here For the Gov't—No Germans Appeared

Eight new citizens were given their papers by Judge Geo. R. Bagley at the circuit court rooms yesterday, it being citizenship day. Examiner Tyler, of Seattle, was present to interrogate the applicants and his questioning was very severe as compared with former examinations. Two women applicants were admitted, Miss Anna Egli, of Hillsboro, and Mrs. Anna Hoier, of Beaverton, Route 4. On replying as to taxation, Miss Egli was splendid in her answers, showing a breadth of thought that was remarkable. Mrs. Hoier, who is a native of Denmark, was also good, and they both showed a thorough knowledge of the governing powers and custom of the country. Seven men failed to pass, some through failure properly to study the form of government, and one or two because they did not comprehend the situation and became nervous, while another had witnesses which were faulty in their replies. Computation, However, Can Not be Relied on

COUNTY NOT TO BE HIT HARD

State Filled Her Quota for the First Draft in Guard and Volunteers

If volunteers and the National Guard go for anything Oregon will have to furnish for the first draft not over 93 men for army building. This will mean but a very few for Oregon, and Washington County's conscription would figure almost down to three or four men.

One will do well, however, to not bank on this computation, for no one knows to a certainty just what will be done. Drafting will not start until next week, or later, as many counties in the Union are not yet organized as to draft boards, and the government is to wait until all is ready.

It is expected that Oregon will get credit for all the Guard and for the volunteers, which have been heavy.

The local board will probably be able to give out something definite in another week.

Portland papers are publishing that the state quota is 93 and this may be right. Again, it may be error. And there you are!
