

JAKE TUPPER STRUCK BY A FALLING TREE

Was One of the Most Powerful Men in Washington County

STRUCK EARLY TUESDAY MORNING

Death Ensued at Noon—Leaves Widow and Two Sons to Mourn Loss

Jacob Tupper, of Forest Grove, was struck by a tree early Tuesday morning while falling timber on the Darling Smith place, near Gaston. He was taken to the Forest Grove hospital, and survived until noon. He was aged 36 years, and was one of the most powerful men in the county. He leaves a widow, a former resident of Astoria, and two sons, aged 15 and 13.

Mr. and Mrs. Tupper were here a week ago Tuesday, on legal business with the law firm of Hare & McAlear. Mrs. Tupper went on to Astoria to settle some business affairs, and Mr. Tupper returned to the Grove. While in the city they were guests of Wm. Tupper and family.

Tupper weighed about 220 pounds, and was a splendid specimen of physical manhood. In olden days he was a crack football player and all-round athlete. He was a son of Carl Tupper, of Dilley.

Dr. Erwin and Robb went up to consult with Dr. Kaufman and arrived just as Tupper was brought to the hospital. Attendants succeeded in getting him to the upper floor when he expired. He was struck across the abdomen and bled to death internally.

WAR DEPT. SENDS OUT DRAFT INSTRUCTIONS

What the Men Should do When Their Numbers Are Called

ADJUTANT-GENERAL MAKES IT PLAIN

Reports Now Say Conscription Numbers Will be Out by Next Week

Adj.-Gen. White, of Portland, sends out the following instructions anent the proposed draft which will call 36 men (or more) from this county:

Portland, Ore., July 19.—Every man in Oregon registered under the selective conscription act should know just what to do if his number is drawn and he is called for service on the first draft, soon to be made.

First, a man should learn at once, if he has not already done so, the new red ink serial number of his registration card. He can learn this by applying to his local county exemption board.

As soon as the names of the men to be called from Oregon on the first draft are known, the local exemption board in each county will post a list of the men drawn from that county. Only in counties that have already supplied their full quotas through volunteers in the regular army and National Guard, will this be done.

The county exemption boards will also send notification, at the address on his registration card, to each man called. This letter will direct the man drafted to appear before the board, for physical examination on a specified date.

Whether or not the man called intends to file a claim for exemption or discharge, he must appear without fail on the date named.

If he desires to file a claim for exemption or discharge, he has 7 days in which to do so from the day the call to him was mailed and posted. The procedure is more simple than is generally supposed.

First, if you come under the exempted class, go to your exemption board and ask for Form 110 for exemption, or Form 121 for discharge (men having dependents apply for discharge instead of for exemption.) Second, fill out the proper form and file it with the board. Third, do this within 7 days of the posting of the call to you to present yourself before the board.

After having filed your claim, however, you will still have ten days in which to file proof. All proofs must be in the form of affidavits. Upon application the board will give you the official blank forms for these affidavits. Have the affidavits properly made out and return them to the board within the 10 day time limit.

Another important fact to remember is that county exemption boards cannot consider claims for industrial exemption. Such claims must be made to one of the three district boards that will sit at Portland, at LaGrande and at Eugene.

THIRTY-SIX NUMBER OF COUNTY DRAFT

These Are Latest Figures From Portland Newspaper Offices

SUPPOSED THAT DRAFT COMES SOON

Probably Next Week Decision Will be Made and Boards Will Start

Conscription will probably start next week some time if indications are worth anything. It appears that several states have not yet organized their boards and the government wants all in readiness before the selective draft commences.

Adjutant General White thinks that Washington County will have to furnish 36 men out of the total of 717 that Oregon must supply the army. Just how the local board will distribute this selection is not known. It is not likely that it will be drawn with respect to other locality than the mere county boundaries, for if it were it would mean that Hillsboro has already put up more than her share of the quota. Towns will be expected to furnish a greater quota than the country, anyway, for there are always more young men in proportion to the population than in the rural districts. The selection of 36 men will not mean more than a day or so of work by the examining board—Sheriff Applegate, Clerk Kurati and Dr. W. D. Wood.

JOHN H. P. VEACH

John H. P. Veach died at his home in East Hillsboro, Sunday evening, July 15, 1917. He had been reading and talking. He made some remark, and was asked a question. Making no answer it was discovered that he was lifeless, death coming in an instant. He was born in Indiana, March 1, 1846. While a young man he moved to Clarinda, Iowa, where he received his education. He married Harriet W. Litzberg, Sept. 12, 1867. To this union were born seven sons and a daughter. One son and the daughter died in infancy. The second son, William, was killed at Sheridan, Wyoming, while performing his duties as deputy sheriff, June 13, 1914. His wife and five sons mourn his loss—George R. Perry, T. Jesse N., residing at Rushville, Nebraska; Amzi, Valentine, Neb.; Harry, Portland.

Mr. Veach was a consistent Christian, having united with the M. E. Church when a young man. His life was a daily testimony of his religion. He came to Hillsboro three years ago on account of his wife's health. He was a member of the Masonic lodge at Sheridan, Wyoming.

The funeral will take place tomorrow (Friday) at 10 o'clock a. m., Rev. Walton Skipworth officiating. Interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery by the side of the son who was killed in Wyoming and brought here for interment. Services at the cemetery will be under direction of Tuality Lodge A. F. & A. M.
