THRESHERS MEET AT COMMERCIAL CLUB

Organize With Wm. Hanson, Pres., F. A. Hohman, Secy.

TO AGAIN MEET SATURDAY EVENING

Will Then Take up Matter of Weights and Measures, Etc.

A dozen threshermen met at the Commercial Club Rooms in this city Tuesday evening and organized for the 1917 season. Wm. Hanson, of Scholls, was elected President and F. A. Hohman, of South Cornelius, was selected for the secretary. After organization they voted to meet again this coming Saturday evening to take up the matter of uniformity of weights, measures and prices, and all threshermen are invited to be present.

Those present at the Tuesday evening session were Wm. Hanson, F. A. Hohman, T. Holmes, H. G. and A. Bauer, J. G. F. and Chris Wenger, Roy Fair, L. J. and Will Holtz and V. L. Bogard.

In the past threshermen here have been poorly organized and this is the first real attempt of threshers to get together.

The dairymen have an organization and growers of wool have always organized, so the threshermen concluded to see what organization would do for their business.

Machines have operated for years here, and many with losses. The separators which have handled the small jobs in the hill districts have always had a hard time to make the balances come on the right side of the ledger. They will now see if organization can be of assistance.

W. T. DuBois, of Spokane, has bought the Den of Sweets from Jas. Miltenberger, and has taken possession.

Iwaichi Sueyoshi, a Japanese, was struck by a block-offset from a tower connected with a Ledgerwood engine, at the Wheeler Logging plant Monday, at two o'clock, sustaining a fracture of the skull, from which he died within an hour. The Jap was splitting wood underneath the tower, when the cable broke, letting the block fall. It struck a stump and bounced on the head of the unfortunate man. He was aged 38 years and had a wife and child in Japan. The Japanese vice-consul, of Portland, went up to Cochran along with Coroner Hyde and Sheriff Applegate for investigation, Tuesday.

The camp is working under the Industrial Commission, and the State will pay the widow \$30 per month until she remarries, and her child will get \$6 per month. In case she remarries the state can settle with the widow for not less than \$300, in the sum advanced, connected as a part.

A number of Japs went out from Portland to witness the investigation, and their salaams to the dead, consisting of three bows to the body, were of interest to the spectators, as a matter of rites.
