

PRODUCERS OF HOPS ARE FEELING BETTER

Price is Strong, Offerings of 32 Cents in Portland, Yesterday

MANY ACRES PLOWED UP IN COUNTY

Prospects Are Good That Price Will Be Still Higher Later

The hop market has been showing a remarkably strong tendency the past week, and it is stated that Portland was yesterday offering 32 cents, although this could not be verified. It looks as though the price will grow a little better right along this fall, and those who have hops for harvest are jubilant that they, like many of their neighbors, did not plow up their vines last fall, after a year or two of low barometer on the price stuff.

In Washington County it is estimated that over a thousand acres of yards were discontinued last fall, and the land put to other crops. The crop here this year is not exceptionally heavy, but it is superlative in most places. Those who stood on the "burning deck" when all but they had fled are now glad they failed to get into the stampede.

An old hopman stated yesterday that it would not surprise him if hops did not go to 50 cents before the season closed this fall, but he also intimated that he would sell on a good profitable market rather than take chances. The money to be expended for picking this year will not be more than from 60 to 75 per cent of last year's payments, owing to scarcity of acreage.

LOCAL WAR BOARD MAILED OUT NOTICES

Selected Men Must be Ready to Report Within 24 Hours

AFTER NEXT NOTICE IS SENT THEM

Notified so Drafted Men Can Get Business Affairs Into Shape

The local war board has mailed notices to all men certified into the army, and forty-two have been given word by mail to get their affairs into shape. When the next notice comes they must be ready to report within 24 hours.

The next notice, which will be sent when ordered by the Secretary of War, will read:

"By direction of the Secretary of War you are hereby ordered to report to the office of this local board at —, M., on the day of —, 1917, for military duty and for transportation to the Army Mobilization Camp. From the date herein specified for you to report, you will be in the military service of the United States and subject to military law. Failure to report or unpunctuality are grave military offenses punishable by court martial. Willful failure to report with intention to evade military service constitutes desertion, which is a capital offense in time of war. Present yourself at the precise hour specified in order that you may not begin your military record in the service of your country with delinquency.

You will be held under the orders of this board until the hour of departure of your train. During this period the Local Board will furnish food and lodging. If you live within one hour's travel of the office of the Local Board you may obtain permission to eat and sleep at home. Nothing but hand baggage can be taken along.

HILLSBORO CANNERY WORKING OVERTIME

Now Working on String Beans in Vast Quantities, 2 Tons on Floor

CHERRY-LOGANBERRY SEASON OVER

Will Put up Evergreen Blackberries—All Cannery Can Buy in Market

The Hillsboro Cannery, in which are interested Dr. W. D. Wood, Jos. Connell and the Gilletts, is working overtime these days. Yesterday eighteen women and girls were busy getting string beans ready for canning, and three men were assisting the Gilletts, father and son, who have charge of the cooking and canning.

The concern had 5,000 pounds of green beans on the floor yesterday morning, and by last night the pile had vanished. Beans will furnish the principal article for a month yet. Peas have been canned, but not extensively.

Nine and a half tons of cherries are ready for the market, of which 15,000 lbs are Royal Anns. Nineteen thousand pounds of Mr. Loganberries are ready for sale and on the way to purchasers.

The cannery will run just as long as it pays at all to operate it, and it has been a big factor in local prices of vegetables and fruit.

If the season is made profitable Dr. Wood states that next year they will get contracts and have a bigger equipment.

The Williams cannery, east of town, has been running capacity, and between the two concerns Hillsboro is very nicely represented in the cannery world.
