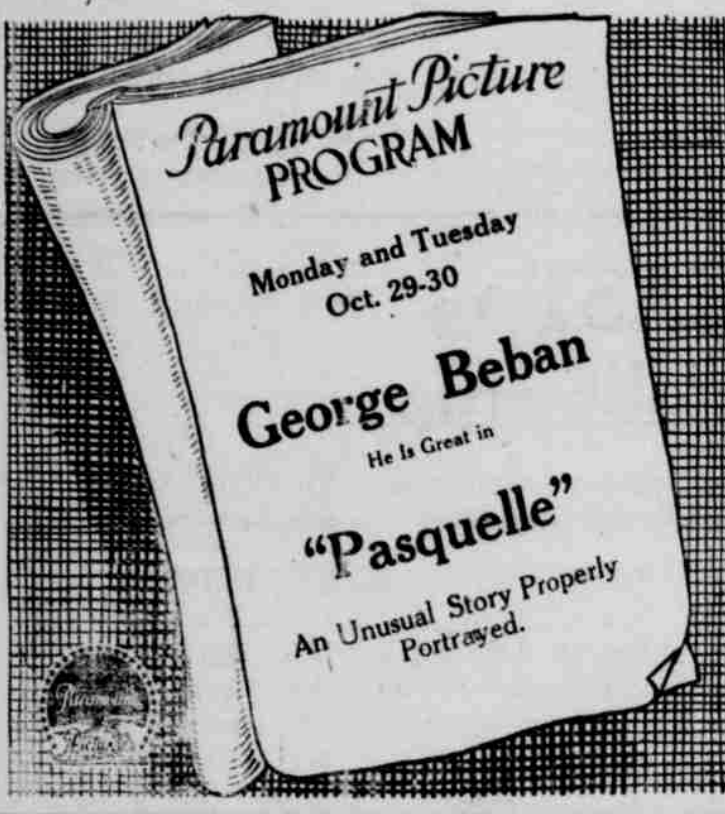

SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Washington County. Galus Creek & Wilson River Railroad Company, a corporation, Plaintiff, vs. Earl Dooley, Defendant.

To Earl Dooley, the above named defendant:

In the name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby notified and required to appear in the above entitled Court and answer the amended complaint of the plaintiff filed against you in the entitled cause, on or before Friday the 7th day of December, 1917, said date being after the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons upon you, the date of the first publication thereof being 25th day of October, 1917, and the date of the last publication being the 6th day of December, 1917, and if you fail to so appear and answer said amended complaint for want thereof the plaintiff will take judgment against you that an assessment be had of the damages which you will sustain by reason of the appropriation of the following described parcel of real estate, situate in Washington County, Oregon, to-wit:

A strip of land 100 feet wide, being 50 feet in width on each side of, and parallel with, the center line of the Galus Creek & Wilson River Railroad Company, located right of way as the same is located, surveyed and may be hereafter constructed, through the north half of the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter (N½ of SE¼ of SE¼) of Section thirty-six (36) township two (2) north, range four (4) West W. 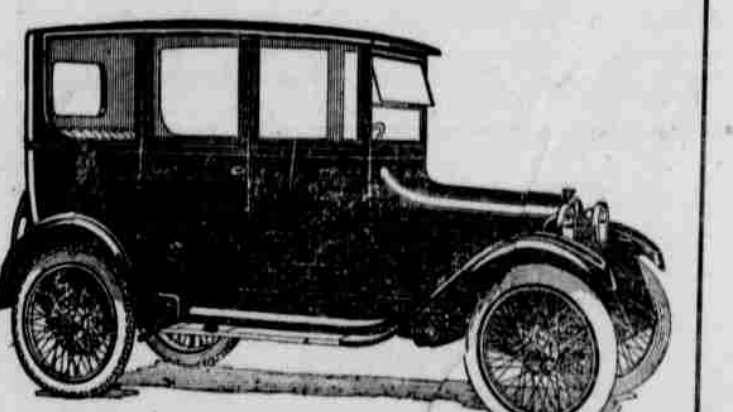
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
