LIBERTY BOND DRIVE

The Liberty Bond drive for Hillsboro and Washington County ended Saturday night. Hillsboro's quota of \$150,000 will be more than filled. Chairman C. E. Wells, who has been working the field with his committees, reported at four o'clock Saturday evening that the sum apportioned to Hillsboro had more than been raised. The banks are checking up the subscriptions, and in all likelihood the subscriptions will run to \$170,000.

At three the Hillsboro Commercial and patrons had signed up for slightly over \$50,000; the Hillsboro National for a like amount, and A. C. Shute, of the Shute Savings, reported that the bank and its patrons would run the list up from \$60,000 to \$70,000 stronger.

Forest Grove signed up more than her quota for \$100,000, and Sherwood, Beaverton, North Plains, Banks, Gaston and other points all exceeded expectations. The state at large, however, did not come through as well as Washington County. The National drive exceeded the amount by millions.

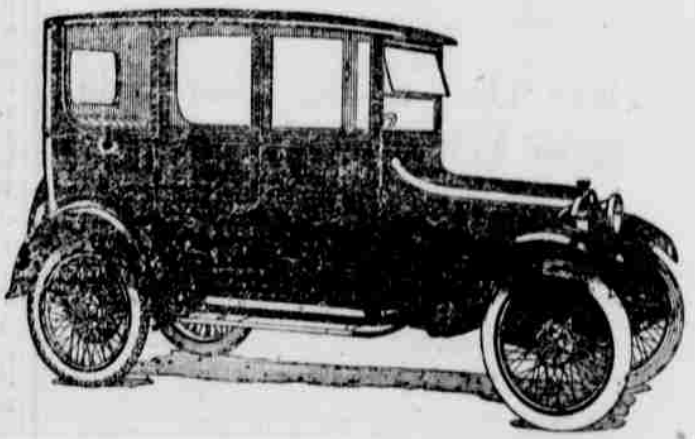
