

## CONGRESS PASSES NEW ARMY BUDGET

Provides For Family of Soldier if  
He is Married and has Children

CAN GET AS HIGH AS FIFTY PER

Cent is to Make it Equitable—Passes  
Both Houses in October

Dependency cases where enlisted men are married, or have father or mother dependent have the following legislation by Congress, in October as a bearing. Such enlistments will get help from the Federal government, and the law covers a wide range. The local war board sends the Argus following:

"Section 201 provides for allotments of pay of every enlisted man, compulsory as to wife (divorced wife in certain cases), compulsory as to child, voluntary as to other persons. Monthly compulsory allotments shall be in an amount equal to family allowances hereinafter specified but not more than one-half pay, or less than \$15. The enlisted man may allot any portion or amount of his pay in addition to the compulsory allotment for such purposes and persons as he may direct, subject to Regulations. The Secretary of War may require that any portion of one-half pay which is not allotted shall be deposited in the military pay deposit fund for the benefit of the man. Compulsory allotment may be waived on written consent of wife supported by evidence of her ability to support herself and children. Compulsory allotment may be excused for good cause shown."

"2. A family allowance not to exceed \$50 per month, in addition to pay allotted by the man shall be paid upon application, which may be made by the man, or made by or in behalf of the beneficiary. No family allowance shall be paid for any period preceding November 1, 1917. Family allowance will be paid from time of enlistment."

"3. Beneficiaries entitled to family allowance and schedules. Class A—Wife, child or children:

(a) If there be a wife but no children, \$15.

(b) If there be a wife and one child, \$25.

(c) If there be a wife and two children, \$32.50, and \$5.00 per month additional for each additional child.

(d) If there be no wife but one child, \$5.

(e) If there be no wife but two children, \$12.50.

(f) If there be no wife but three children, \$20.

(g) If there be no wife but four children, \$30, with \$5 per month additional for each additional child.

Class B—Grandchild, parent, brother or sister:

(a) If there be one parent, \$10.

(b) If there be two parents, \$20.

(c) For each grandchild, brother, sister and additional parent, \$5.

Supt., took occasion to offer the gifts of the school—handsome prayer books—to the enlisted men who are sons of the church, five in number, Frank and Arthur Rollins, Jas. Mahon, Robt. CHILD BURNS TO DEATH

Nora Walker, the little four and a half year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Walker, of south of Huber, burned to death Sunday. Her father was burning a lot of debris in a pit, and the little girl, with some other children, was playing about the flames. She suddenly pitched forward into the fire and her clothing ignited. She extricated herself from the pit and ran towards the house, her dress aflame. She fell before reaching the house and the clothing was burned nearly off the child. Death ensued in four or five hours. The little one's body was completely charred. The funeral took place Monday, at the Cooper Mountain Evangelical Church, Rev. A. H. Miller, of Hillsboro, conducting the services.

ASKS TWENTY THOUSAND

Francis Willard Taylor, aged 16 years, has sued Ray Moore, supervisor in 1916 for Road District No. 31, Washington County, for \$20,000 damages for injuries received in an accident at a quarry at which Moore was a foreman. The injury took place on Sept. 21, 1916, and the complaint says that the left arm of the young man was so badly mangled that he can not move his fingers with the muscles for that purpose. Young Taylor says that the injury was caused by his glove catching in a chain carrier while he was attempting to remove some rocks which had clogged the chute which carried rock to the crusher. His father, S. P. Taylor, was made guardian ad litem during the pendency of the suit.

## NINE MEN REPORT FOR THE U. S. ARMY

Reach Hillsboro This Morning for  
Ten O'Clock Roll Call

SIX TO FILL LIST—FOUR MORE

Will Leave For American Lake Tomorrow  
at 4:45 on Southern Pacific

Eight men reported to Sheriff Applegate this morning at ten o'clock and experienced their initial entrance into the army of Uncle Sam. The War Board sends six on the regular list, and by tomorrow will know whether the remaining men must go to fill the places of those rejected or discharged at the Lake. Leslie Robinson, on the list, is at Sand Point, Idaho, ready to go upon receipt of transportation. The Sheriff will send at once.

Those reporting this morning at roll call were Chas. Schmidlin, of Buxton; Waldemar Prah, of Hillsboro; Harry Hansen, Bethany; Stephen Kemper, Forest Grove; Henry Vandecovering, of Centerville; Edw. H. Kaufman, of Hillsboro, Route 1; Lawrence J. Bacon, of Cornelius; Jas. H. Brandaw, of Hillsboro.

The following six, lowest numbers on the list, will go in any event: Schmidlin, Prah, Hansen, Kemper, Vandecovering and Kaufman.

Owing to several discharges at the Lake more than likely the entire eight will be sent from here, as well as Robinson, at Sand Point. Beringer did not show up the only one in the list reported absent or whereabouts unknown. He may be here in the morning. If not, he will suffer the fate of Leo J. Gray, of Orenco, who has been posted as a deserter.

All the boys reporting went to their home to report again Friday morning, with the sole exception of Schmidlin, of Buxton, who remains in the city until he entrains.

JESSE NELSON GARDNER

Jesse Nelson Gardner, of Rose Lodge, Lincoln County, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. R. Bowers, in this city, Oct. 28, 1917. He was born in St. Anthony Falls, Minn., Aug. 8, 1853, and moved to California with his parents in 1860, settling in East Portland, after coming to Oregon in 1865. As a young man Gardner ran stock in Eastern Oregon and on the Columbia River. He was married to Lucy Gillihan, a daughter of Martin Gillihan, a well known Portland stockman and capitalist, April 3, 1878. A few years ago he came to Washington County and conducted a sawmill on the present site of Orenco. Later he moved to Lincoln County and took up a homestead in the heavily timbered district, which was his home until he was brought to Hillsboro for medical treatment a few weeks ago.

The widow and the following children survive—Mrs. Katie Stiltwell, Tillamook; Mrs. Wm. J. Lichty, Orenco; Mrs. C. R. Bowers, Hillsboro; Nelson, Clarence and Miss Lucy, at Rose Lodge. The funeral was held Tuesday and interment was in the West Union cemetery.
