RED CROSS

The first conference of Hillsboro Auxiliaries, held in headquarters Saturday afternoon was a decided success. The fine weather being no doubt a contributing factor. The presence of prominent Red Cross officials from the Portland Chapter, who spoke during the session, of the various aspects of the work as pertaining to the part of the organization under their supervision, marked an era of progress in the success and extension of the work within Hillsboro's jurisdiction, as pointed out by Mr. McAtear, who presided. Mayor Wall, on behalf of the city, extended a welcome to the visitors and assured them of the official appreciation of the occasion, and also a hearty co-operation if the city were called upon to assist in furthering the extension of the good work.

Lowengart, who is giving all of his time to personally supervise the supply department of Portland Chapter, surprised and delighted all of his hearers by the interesting way in which he talked and the sentiment he expressed in regard to his conversion to the work. He also told of positive facts and quoted exact figures regarding the work and output of the Portland work-

rooms that were very illuminating to members so keenly interested as were those present, and who were also assisting in the enormous output by the work of the auxiliaries they represented. Miss Alice Strong, acting secretary of the Portland Chapter, gave a very clear and concise statement of the recent executive rulings, and also called attention to the Christmas membership drive, which really has a double importance: First, of course, being a desired increase of membership, and secondly, the securing of a fiscal year, in order to have a uniform system throughout the organization.

Mrs. Gillingham, field secretary, assured the auxiliaries of the interest Portland felt in all branches of Red Cross work, and especially in the way the small communities were responding by organizing and doing such excellent work.
 At the conclusion of the meeting, the new rules and specifications for all hospital work, excepting surgical dressings, which will not be undertaken at present, were supplied to the various chairmen, as well as the new materials for work and knitting.
