DRAFT LAW

Through the appointment of Governor Withycombe, all members of the Bar of Washington County, Oregon, have recently been made associate members of the local legal advisory board. Registrants may therefore feel free to at any time call upon any lawyer of Washington County for information with respect to the selective draft act, and assistance will be rendered by the attorneys without compensation. Beginning with the 15th of this month there will be one or more attorneys present throughout the entire thirty days, at the office of the Sheriff, for the purpose of rendering assistance to registrants in filling out their questionnaires.

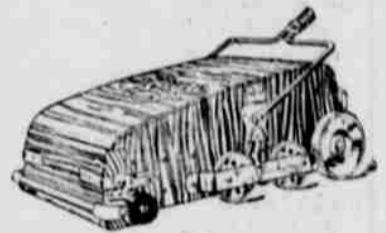

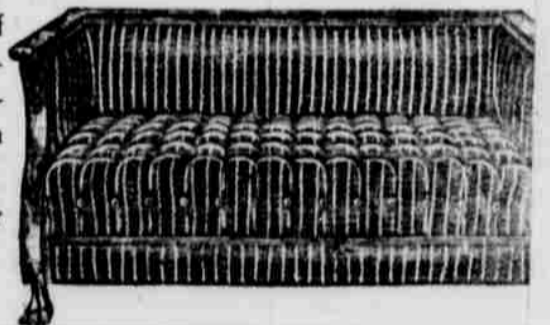

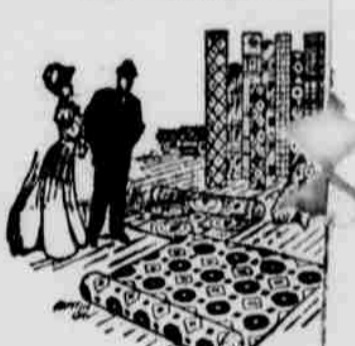
