Of these the war board is satisfied, but has no personal evidence, that O. B. They will again have to undergo examination if the authorities order. Some have defective eyes and may again be examined. Some of the above have also been excused because of dependents, and they may again have to go through the examination pains. All of these names have been sent in to the district board. No exemptions are made here as to vocational work.

HILLSBORO INVENTOR

The Sunday Oregonian contained a half-page article on a well known Hillsboro inventor, Thos. Bilyeu. He recently won the John Scott Legacy Medal, awarded by the Franklin Institute, of Pennsylvania. Mr. Bilyeu is still in his thirties, and has 40 inventions to his credit, one of the latest being a bolt-heading machine now used on ship-building for the government. His device for calking ships is another of his achievements, and he has 40 inventions to his credit. The honor recently conferred is one of the greatest going to inventors in the United States. Mr. Bilyeu and his wife, who is formerly Miss Jessie Schulmerich, and their children, reside on the Luce tract, one of the picturesque homes in Hillsboro.
