

PUBLIC SERVICE MEN VISIT THIS CITY

Takes up Matter of Station at
North Range and Main Streets

LOOKED UP UNION MATTER

Southern Pacific Company Has
Officials Here at Session

The Public Service Commission met at the court house Monday morning to take up two matters. The first was the matter of a station at North Range and Main, to accommodate the passengers on the Tillamook line, both local and those transferring to the Tillamook road. The company stated its willingness to erect a "shelter shed," but Mayor Wall insisted that this was not what was wanted. He said that the traveling public was entitled to a comfortable place, inasmuch as many times trains were not on schedule, and he had seen passengers wait a long time in inclement weather. The S. P. officials objected to putting in a joint station at the Tillamook stop, and there the matter rests until the ruling decides.

The commission went down and looked at the electric lines crossings down on Washington and North Range, and the matter of a physical jointure—that is to say, of the S. P. switching from Sixth to the Oregon Electric and using the Washington Street line as a common user with a joint depot, is still before the commission. Mr. Miller, chairman of the commission, said he did not know just where they stood with Uncle Sam handling the roads, and a decision on this would probably be in abeyance some time.

STOCKHOLDERS' MEETING

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Washington County National Farm Loan Association met in Hillsboro, Jan. 8, and elected the following directors for the ensuing year:

D. B. Cooley, Laurel; E. Wenstrom, Scholls; W. W. Mellor, Reedville; C. H. Meyers; B. F. Clay, Hillsboro, and John A. Kirkwood, Reedville. Officers were elected as follows: B. F. Clay, president; W. W. Mellor, vice president; A. R. England, secretary-treasurer. The members were all enthusiastic over the manner in which the Federal Land Bank at Spokane decided on their applications for farm loans. The returns show that of those already in the bank had allowed loans in the sum of \$96,685.00, and as quick as the abstracts are examined the money will be sent to Hillsboro to place on the property. The farmers will be very much pleased when they get these loans on the amortization plan, which means that they pay the interest and a certain amount of the principal, semi-annually. Farmers who have encumbered property should get in touch with the Association. This report going the rounds that money will not be available is all nonsense, according to the Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. England, and he says Uncle Sam will be there with the funds.

All of the members of the association are great supporters of the legislation, and they say it will mean a big thing, for the farmer must, perchance, carry some encumbrance.

VETERANS COMING TO TELL OF WAR

Will Talk at Crescent Theatre,
Evening of January 18

VETERAN LOST HIS HANDS

Preparations Made to Care for a
Big Audience

Major Edwards, Captain Cook and Colonel MacMillan, of Canada, who very recently returned from the trenches, and addressing the people of this state, are to be in Hillsboro on Friday evening, the 18th of this month, at 8 o'clock, at the Crescent Theatre. These veterans of the trenches have had two years or more of actual war experiences at the front. Major Edwards has lost both hands and is wounded otherwise. They come here under the auspices of the Washington County Patriotic Council, and to hear these veterans will be a distinct privilege.

There will be no admission nor solicitation of contributions of any kind. They are touring the state, giving us the facts as to present war conditions. This meeting is especially intended for residents of the outlying districts, and a special invitation is extended to the farming communities in general. Special arrangements are being made to accommodate the immense audience that will greet these warriors. They will arrive at Hillsboro at 6:40, on the train from McMinnville, and will be entertained at the Washington Hotel and will then proceed to the place of meeting. A short musical program will be rendered.

Excursion Train

The United will run an excursion train from Wilkesboro to Hillsboro via the Orenco cut-off, 55 cents each way from Wilkesboro to Hillsboro, and rates according to these stations, so citizens may come to hear the soldiers make their addresses. The train will start in the neighborhood of 7 o'clock, and will stop at all points on the line. All those wishing to make the trip will please notify A. K. Reynolds at the North Plains warehouse. The train will return after the speaking.

The City of Forest Grove is said to be up against a tax muddle as the millage is 13.20 and the charter allows a taxation of only 10 mills. The matter was taken up before Assessor Boley yesterday.
