Theo. H. Sheffer, of the U. S. Biological Survey, will hold mole and gopher meetings, giving demonstrations in trapping and in the preparation of the hides for market. These meetings will be held at the schools so that the boys and girls may have the opportunity of learning the trapping business, and make the work a part of their Thrift Campaign. FARM DRAINS PLANNED

Farm drainage systems were planned in part, on the farms of L. W. Guild, Bruce Schulmerich and Gus Krause. The soil types on the farms were examined to determine the distance apart of the drains, and with a soil auger, the depth to place the drains was determined. These farmers are planning some extensive drainage for their farms, and when carried to completion should materially increase the productivity of the soil. W. L. Powers, Prof. of Irrigation and Drainage, at the Oregon Agricultural College, directed the work in planning these systems, and his assistance may be secured for other farms by making application to the County Agent.

The County Agent has now established permanent headquarters in Room 3, of the Commercial Bldg., in Hillsboro.

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RED CROSS

A national Junior Red Cross drive will be held in all the schools from Lincoln's birthday, Feb. 12, to Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, and while all may be 100 per cent, schools may come in on 50 per cent basis. Oregon has "gone over the top" in all patriotic work and here is a chance for the school children to respond overwhelmingly. Teachers will be asked to give an hour daily to this work, and if interest is keen, even more. Should there be pupils unable to pay the 25 cents a year, programs may be held to raise money to make the school 100 per cent. There will be a special Red Cross banner for the schools and a pin for each pupil. All money stays with the school excepting 10 per cent for overhead expenses. The teacher acts as treasurer and the pupils decide what class of work will be done. Where schools are adjacent to auxiliaries the chairmen will visit and assist them in their organization and work. When work is completed it will be sent in to Hillsboro, displayed, labeled and then sent on with regular Red Cross supplies.
