CATCH A MOLE

The first meeting of the Mole and Gopher campaign will be held at the West Union School, 10:45 A. M., March 4. Theo. H. Sheffer, of the U. S. Biological Survey, who is an expert trapper, will be present to demonstrate the latest methods of handling these rodents, and will show how the skins may be prepared for market. He will also be prepared to answer questions regarding poisoning moles and gophers, or squirrels.

The demonstrations will be held in twenty other schools in the county, and where possible the other schools will attend. In some cases it is planned by farmers in the district to take the pupils above the fifth grade to the nearest meeting.

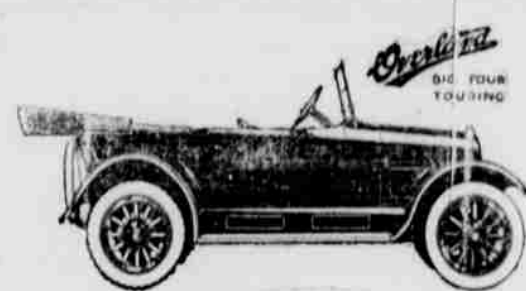
