

SHERIFF LANDS REAL SLACKER IN CALIBOOSE

Six-Footer Picked Up on Gales Creek Tuesday

MOTHER SAYS AGE IS 30

Culprit Taken to Portland This Morning by Officer

Sheriff Applegate went to Gales Creek, above the Watts school house, Tuesday evening, and found a genuine slacker, in the person of Walter E. Willis. Willis was born June 2, 1888, according to the word of his mother, Mrs. Sarah J. Willis. The slacker's father was George Willis, and he was a veteran of the Civil War, being a volunteer both in the Fourth U. S. Artillery and in the 53rd Pa. volunteers. He was wounded in the hip and died 15 years ago, his old wound having always troubled him to great degree. Mrs. Willis owns a part interest in the 79 acre tract, and they moved up there about Christmas. Young Willis is a strapping six-footer and although he claims that he is afflicted with a hernia says he has made his \$175 per month in a Washington State logging camp. On June 5 last he was working in a camp over there. He was lodged in jail Tuesday night and Sheriff Applegate took him to Portland today, turning him over to the Federal authorities. Willis claimed he was past 32 years of age, and said he did not think he was in the draft age. The word of his mother, however, shows to the contrary. Willis is bright mentally and that he was evading the draft provisions is patent on the face of facts.

PATRIOTIC LEAGUE NAMES CHAIRMEN

Purpose of League Is to Assist Government in War Prosecution

TO ENCOURAGE LOYALTY

Each District Chairman May Appoint Four Committeemen

The Washington County Patriotic League, B. J. Simpson, Forest Grove, President; C. E. Wells, Hillsboro, Vice President; and W. Mahon, Hillsboro, secretary, has appointed chairmen of each school district to help further the work and activities in prosecuting the war. The objects and purposes of the league:

"To co-operate with and assist all Federal, State, County and Municipal officials in all their duties having to do with war work and its activities.

To encourage, foster, develop and uphold patriotic loyalty and active support of our American Government during the war.

To accumulate records, data and information, tabulating same in convenient form and place same at the disposal of the Government associations and organizations desiring their use for military, civil, financial, moral or humanitarian purposes in connection with war work.

To render our Government and all officials working under it, assistance in locating alien enemies and other evil-disposed, unpatriotic persons who are not giving loyal support to the Government in its war aims and purposes and to give every aid possible in bringing such persons under the authority of the law.

Every loyal American citizen of Washington County shall be eligible to membership in this organization, upon pledging himself to support the Government of the United States, and the activities of the League during the war.

NEW POTATO PEST

Descriptions of another potato pest have been received which would indicate that the potato celtworm had gotten a start in this County. Further investigation is to be made, and in the meantime an effort will be made to locate fields that are infected, if there are others in the County.

A. E. Lovett of the Agricultural College, states that the typical injury is a galling of the roots, known as root knot, root gall, etc. These irregular enlargements may occur at any point on the main or lateral rootlets. Affected plants appear stunted, wilt and die.

The injury to the potato is also serious, although not in all cases so easily detected. The worms tunnel into the potato to a depth of a quarter inch or more and form a brownish ring of corky texture, the center of which is shiny and pearly white. The worm is about half the size of a pin head. The skin of the infested potato is usually wrinkled, having irregular sunken areas, with a raised center here and there. In its earlier stages, however, there may be no outward indication, and the infection can only be detected by breaking open the potato, or breaking into small pieces.

The only method of control is to select the seed and to properly rotate crops. This latter is rather difficult as there are 500 plants on which the celtworm feeds. Crops that may be used are as follows:

Corn, barley, pearl millet, red top, rye, timothy, wheat, winter oats. These crops planned in a three year rotation will so reduce the pest that potatoes may be grown for a year.

BODY OF JOHN PIEREN FOUND WEDNESDAY

Was Discovered by Sigurd Sorenson, in Cow Trail Near Opening

THREE MILES FROM HOME

Aged Man Had Wandered in Opposite Direction From his Home

The body of John Pieren, aged 74, who disappeared early last Fall in the Helvetia neighborhood, was found yesterday afternoon by Sigurd Sorenson, above Phillips, in the hills. Sigurd was hunting cows and found the body of the aged man in a cow trail within a thousand feet of an opening. Pieren was lost in the darkness, and had been able to have travelled that short distance, he would have seen the light at the Sorenson home. His body was face downward, in the trail, and he had stumbled over a small shrub.

The place where Pieren was found is fully three miles from the Pieren home, and he must have become bewildered after night, and turned away from his course. Several days search failed to recover the body, and one man claimed he had seen him on a train bound for Tacoma. His sons, however, felt sure that he had perished.

The funeral takes place tomorrow. Coroner Limber went out and investigated the case.
