## PATRIOTIC MEETING LARGELY ATTENDED

Ninety School Districts Represented Out of One Hundred Six

ORGANIZATION EQUIPPED  
Ladies Hold Meeting at Library Auditorium in Morning

The Patriotic League and Food Administration conventions held here yesterday were largely attended. Patriotic League members representing 90 school districts out of 106 was the record—a great one considering the condition of the county roads. C. E. Wells called the Patriotic session to order in the Liberty in the morning, and Mayor Wall welcomed the delegates. The Liberty was crowded with members and their families, and it was a great outpouring of patriotism. It was made evident that the organization is now thoroughly equipped and that its members are in deadly earnest to help carry on the big conflict for democracy.

In the afternoon the Liberty was filled to capacity. President B. J. Simpson, of the Grove, presided. Addresses were made by Arthur M. Churchill, Dr. E. H. Pence and Geo. M. Caldwell, of Portland, and their talks were enthusiastically received.

In the morning there was a Food Demonstration session in the Library, attended by the ladies, at which Mr. Churchill and Miss Milan, of O. A. C., talked on conservation of food topics. The meetings yesterday show that there is determined effort to hold up the country and discountenance disloyalty in every form.

### LEAGUE MEETS

A meeting was held last Friday, in the rooms of the Hillsboro Club, attended by prominent members of the Washington County Patriotic League and Local and Executive Committees of the Liberty Loan organization throughout Washington County. A thorough outline of the method of organization and manner of work for the third Liberty Loan was given by Jno. K. Kollock, Secretary of the State Council of Defense.

Complete affiliation was effected between the State Council of Defense and the Washington County Patriotic League, which latter has probably the most thorough organization of its kind in the State.

Every family in Washington County is indexed by School Districts, and the organization is completed down to the appointment of a District Chairman and four District Vice Chairmen in every school district in the county.

Arrangements were perfected for a joint convention to be held at Hillsboro, on Wednesday, the 20th, combining the Food Conservation Convention and demonstrations, to be addressed by Arthur M. Churchill, Chairman, and Miss Ava B. Milan, of O. A. C. with the general convention of the District Chairmen of the Washington County Patriotic League.

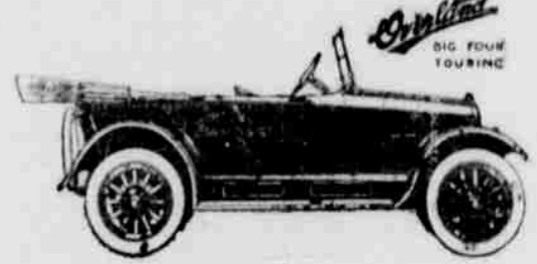
