"We sure saw some fine scenery on our way, Great Salt Lake is a fine body of water, about 40 miles wide and 60 miles long—a good place to boat ride. In our trip of several days and nights through the different states, I saw nothing to equal my own native state, Old Oregon—it is the 'best ever.' Believe me, it was some change of climate for us from 'Sunny California' to this place. When we arrived the wind was blowing a gale and say, it was cold. We were quite tired after our long ride, but we received a compliment from an old lady as we were getting off the train that made us all feel better. ### MARINE CORPS

The United States Marine Corps is calling for 2,000 men at once. Men between the ages of 18 and 36 years, including registered and married men, may enlist. The Marine Corps is the oldest branch of the U. S. service, being organized before either the Army or Navy. They have carried the flag to victory in Tripoli, Sumatra, Fiji Islands, Mexico, Philippines, China, Haiti and Santa Domingo. Marines are serving in France at the present time, they being the first American troops of the Expeditionary Forces to set foot on French soil.

Marines are trained and serve as Infantry, Artillery, Cavalry, Engineers, and Signalmen also on board Battleships and Cruisers. Men can enter this splendid branch of service only by voluntary enlistment. Men desiring to enlist for the duration of the War can obtain full information by calling in person or writing to the United States Marine Corps Recruiting Station, Panama Bldg., Third and Alder Sts., Portland, Oregon.

### COUNTY COW TESTING

Washington Cow Testing Association has completed another month's work, and the tester, Clair Wilkes, makes a very interesting report for the month. During the period 302 cows were tested for production, and 65 of that number produced over 40 lbs. of fat, while 17 produced over 50 lbs. of fat. The average production for the whole number of cows in the association was 760 lbs. of milk and 33.5 of fat. This is much above the average production for the whole state, and indicates the good breeding of the cows in the association and also shows that the dairymen are giving their herds the best of care.

Geo. F. Biersdorf, of Corne-

lius, is the owner of the highest producing cow for the month. Noble Lad's Lady Helen. Three year old pure bred Jersey, owned by him, produced 1080 lbs. of milk and 60.9 lbs. of fat. Mr. Biersdorf's herd also led the association for the month. His 11 cows make an average production of 835 lbs. milk and 46.3 of fat. The second highest herd is owned by Robb Bros., of Forest Grove. This herd of 10 cows produced 704 lbs. of milk and 42.2 lbs. of fat per cow. The highest grade cow for the association was Chancy, owned by Chas. H. Bamford, of Hillsdale. This cow, a Grade Jersey, age 5, produced 1278 lbs. of milk and 60 lbs. of fat. This was her first month of lactation, and it will be interesting to note how persistent she will be in keeping up this high record. 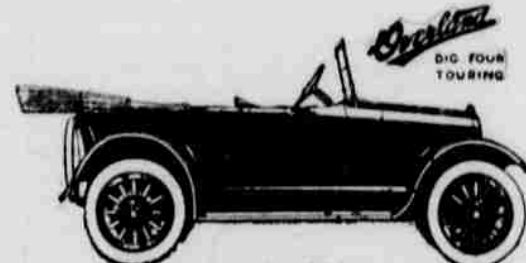
