farmers present at the meetings. The formula used was one used successfully by the United States Biological Survey for five years in squirrel eradication work in the West.

Several years of rodent eradication work in those counties of Oregon and other western states organized for county agent work has demonstrated the fact that most effective results are obtained through community effort. In Central Oregon, where the work has been carried on for several years, the spring activities of the squirrel clubs are regular features of the farmers' spring work. By meeting in a community way to mix the poison more extensive use of the poison is obtained; it is mixed at a less cost per unit and is mixed the same for the whole neighborhood, and the danger to animals and even to the family is reduced since the deadly ingredients are not loosened and left lying around on the farm.

Any communities in which the squirrels are doing damage should notify the County Agent and steps will be taken for a drive on the pests. These animals do thousands of dollars damage annually, and in these days of extreme conservation are doubly a foe. By poisoning none much of the spring increase will also be exterminated.
