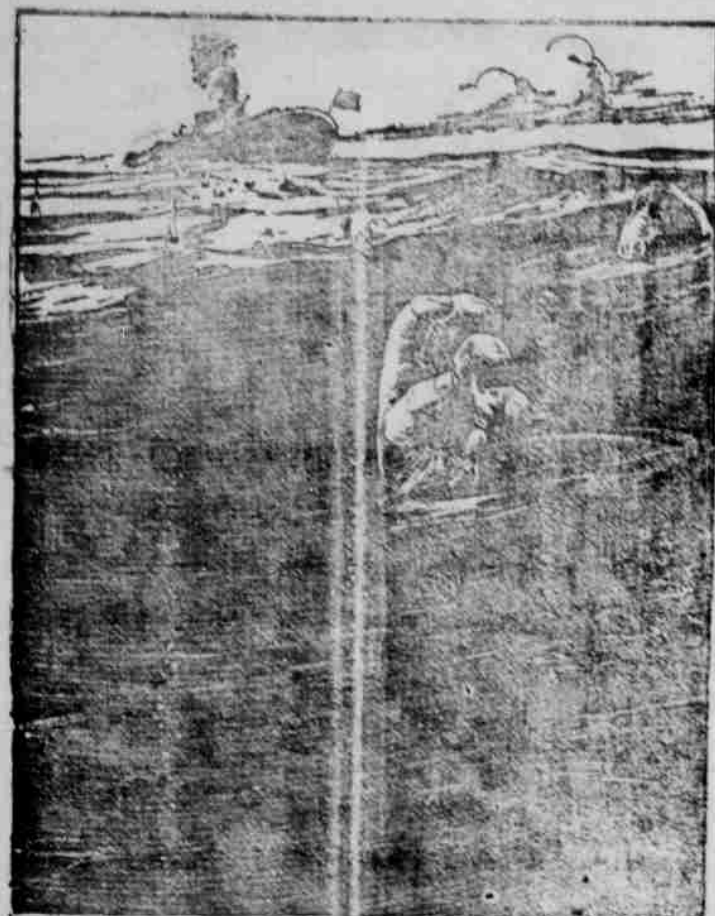

SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Washington County.

Rebecca Wilkes, Plaintiff, vs. Orton A. Graham, W. C. Repas, E. B. Woodyard, W. F. Phillips and Jane Doe Phillips, his wife, Defendants. To W. F. Phillips and Jane Doe Phillips, his wife, the above named defendants.

In the name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby required to appear in the above entitled court and answer the amended complaint filed against you in the above entitled cause, on or before the 15th day of June, 1918, said date being after the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons; and if you fail so to appear and answer said amended complaint for want thereof, plaintiffs will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in her complaint, to-wit: For judgment against the defendants Orton A. Graham, W. C. Repas, E. B. Woodyard and W. F. Phillips and Jane Doe Phillips, his wife, in the sum of \$350.00 in U. S. gold coin, with interest thereon from the 28th day of May, 1916, at the rate of 7 per cent per annum, and the further sum of \$100.00 attorney's fees, and the costs and disbursements of this suit, and for a decree declaring the said first mortgage of plaintiff described in her amended complaint, to be a first lien and mortgage upon the real property in said amended complaint described prior and superior to the interest, right, title, claim and lien of each and all of the defendants, and that the interest, right, claim and lien of each and all of the defendants be declared and decreed to be inferior, subordinate and subject in all respects to the lien of plaintiff's said mortgage; that plaintiff's said mortgage be foreclosed, and that the real property therein, and in plaintiff's amended complaint described, to-wit: Situate in Washington County, Oregon, to-wit: The Southeast quarter of the Northeast quarter of Section 13, in T. 3 N.
