COUNTY FAIR

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Washington County Fair Board called by the president, Mr. Wescott, it was decided to hold the fair this fall and it was also decided that a manager should be elected to take charge of the work and to whom the responsibility of staging the fair should be turned over. At the same meeting the Board of the old Fair Association was present and the books and other property of the old Association were turned over to the new officers. The matter of place to hold a fair was also taken up and on learning that the properties now owned by the Fair Association and put in place in Forest Grove could not be duplicated in another location for less than \$1,000 it was decided to temporarily locate the fair at Forest Grove and for the next year to obtain a permanent location for the fair and to get grounds for same.

The resignation of secretary, N. C. Jamison, was tendered, it being felt that members of the Board and its officers should represent definite localities or particular interests in the county-wide organization.

The date of the fair was also decided upon for September 19th and 20th. Price of tickets were also decided upon. Two-day tickets being placed at 50c, single admission tickets at 35c and family tickets at \$1.00.

DEPOSITS GUARANTEED

A bill for the Guarantee of Deposits in National Banks is now before the U. S. Senate for consideration. When this law goes into effect, and the depositors of National Banks know that the U. S. Government is guaranteeing their deposits, we will have strength and stability and confidence in National Banks such as was never known before. Money, which is now hid away at home, will be brought to the bank and placed in circulation, and the owner will be getting interest on it. The poor man, with only small savings, will have peace of mind, comfort and confidence, when he knows the U. S. Government stands between him and any loss he might sustain, and he will put his money in a National Bank.

While each National bank of our country is a member of the U. S. Federal System and guarded by U. S. banking laws, yet, we hope to soon see this Guarantee of Deposits law go into effect.

FLOUR SALES SMALL

Hillsboro, Or., June 11, 1918. Editor Argus: I am advised by Arthur M. Churchill, State Conservation Chairman, that all but two counties in Oregon have gone on a voluntary wheatless basis. Portland millers and jobbers have recently adopted a resolution undertaking to sell no more wheat flour within the state until July 1st, the action after that time to be determined by the general wheat and flour condition.

Window cards are being prepared for all retail dealers who are cooperating in the voluntary "no flour sales" program, as a recognition by the Food Administration of the loyalty of these dealers.

As a result of this general action toward conservation of wheat I was informed at the millers and jobbers meeting in Portland that the sales of wheat flour have been reduced to slightly over 25 per cent. of last year's consumption.

Oregon can surely claim to be

doing its patriotic share in feeding the starving among our Allies and supplying the wants of the boys "over there."

An unexpectedly large number of families are turning flour over to the Government in response to the recent call. We hope to accumulate this flour during the present week for shipment to Portland where the Milling Division will prepare it for immediate export by one of the Portland built ships.

All dealers in the county are authorized to receive from loyal people who desire to turn it over to the Government, any flour which is in good condition, paying therefore the retail price paid by the purchaser, the dealers drawing upon the State Food Administrator for the amount so paid.

MRS. SARAH SCHOLFIELD

Mrs. Sarah Vilena Hall Scholfield died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. J. Ward, of Gaston, Wednesday morning, June 12, 1918, after an illness covering several months. Her maiden name was Sarah Vilena Hall, and she was born in Geny County, Missouri, Feb. 17, 1847. Her parents, Noah and Rosanna Hall, started to Oregon the spring of 1847, crossing the continent in an oxteam. Mr. Hall died shortly after they reached The Dalles. Her mother came on to Washington County with the rest of the wagon train of the company. Mrs. Hall was married to Wm. McLinn in 1848, and they took up the McLinn donation claim, a mile east of Cornelius, where Mrs. Scholfield was raised, and where she was wedded to Benj. Scholfield, Oct. 22, 1863. After marriage they lived at Hillsboro several years, all their children, excepting one, being born here. Later they moved to the Davis place, north of Hillsboro, and from there back to the old McLinn Donation, which the husband had purchased in 1877. They made this their place and Cornelius their home until June 24, 1917, when Mr. Scholfield passed away.

Seven children were born to the union, Henrietta, dying infancy, and Mrs. Rosa B. Cook, some years after her marriage. The surviving children are Mrs. Ruth Cornelius, wife of County Judge Scott Cornelius, of Astoria; Wm. T. Scholfield, of Staff, Mont.; Mrs. Rebecca Goodin, wife of Wm. A. Goodin, of Cornelius; Mrs. Mary Ward, wife of E. J. Ward, of Gaston, and Mrs. Harriett E. Yoder, of Adams, Or. Mrs. Scholfield was highly esteemed and for years the Scholfield home was the center of pioneer hospitality. She was devoted to church work, and was one of the charter members of the Hillsboro Grange. She was a devoted wife and mother, and her death is deplored by a large circle of friends.

The funeral takes place tomorrow morning, at the Cornelius M. E. Church, at 2 p. m.

COUNTY COW-TESTING

The Washington County Cow-Testing Association reports completion for another month's testing, and tester, C. H. Bryant, gives the following figures: Three hundred and ninety-four cows were tested during the last monthly period and the average production of milk per cow was 665.5 lbs. The average production of butter fat was 30.8 lbs. Of the total number of cows 62 produced over 40 lbs. of butter fat and 11 of that number produced over 50 lbs. of fat. The records also show that the average feed cost per cow during the month was \$8.61. The three highest producing herds are as follows: Herd of 4 cows owned by A. E. Wescott averaged 1,081 lbs. of milk and 59.5 lbs. of fat. Robb Bros. herd of 7 cows, 697 lbs. of milk and 40 lbs. of fat. Geo. Biersdorf's herd of 11 cows, 696 lbs. of milk and 39.8 lbs. of fat. The highest producing cow for the month is "Princess," a Jersey, owned by A. E. Wescott. This cow in the first month of her lactation period produced 1,281 lbs. of milk and 73 lbs. of fat. The highest producing grade cow in the Association was "Red Hawk" owned by Bruce Schulerich. This cow produced 1,026 lbs. of milk and 57.5 lbs. of fat. Herds in which there were cows producing over 50 lbs. of fat are owned by the following dairymen: Wm. Behrman, L. R. Campbell, Bruce Schulerich, J. J. VanKleek & Son, Henry Behrman, A. E. Wescott, Robb Bros. and Geo. F. Biersdorf.

The Guernsey Breeders' picnic that was to have been held at the farm of W. A. Goodin, of Cornelius, has been postponed indefinitely. The postponement of this meeting has been made necessary on account of unavoidable reasons and it is hoped that at a date in the near future it will be possible for the Guernsey people to get together.

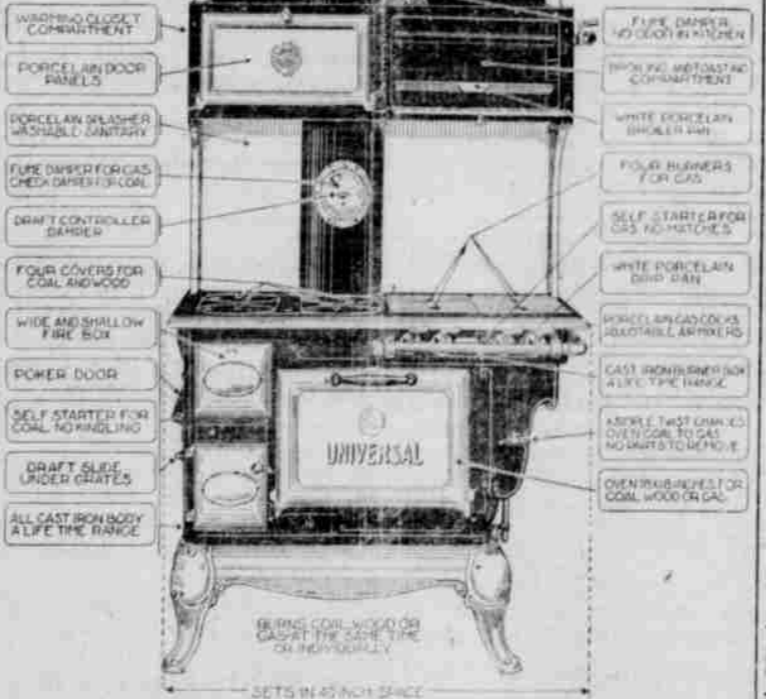
