

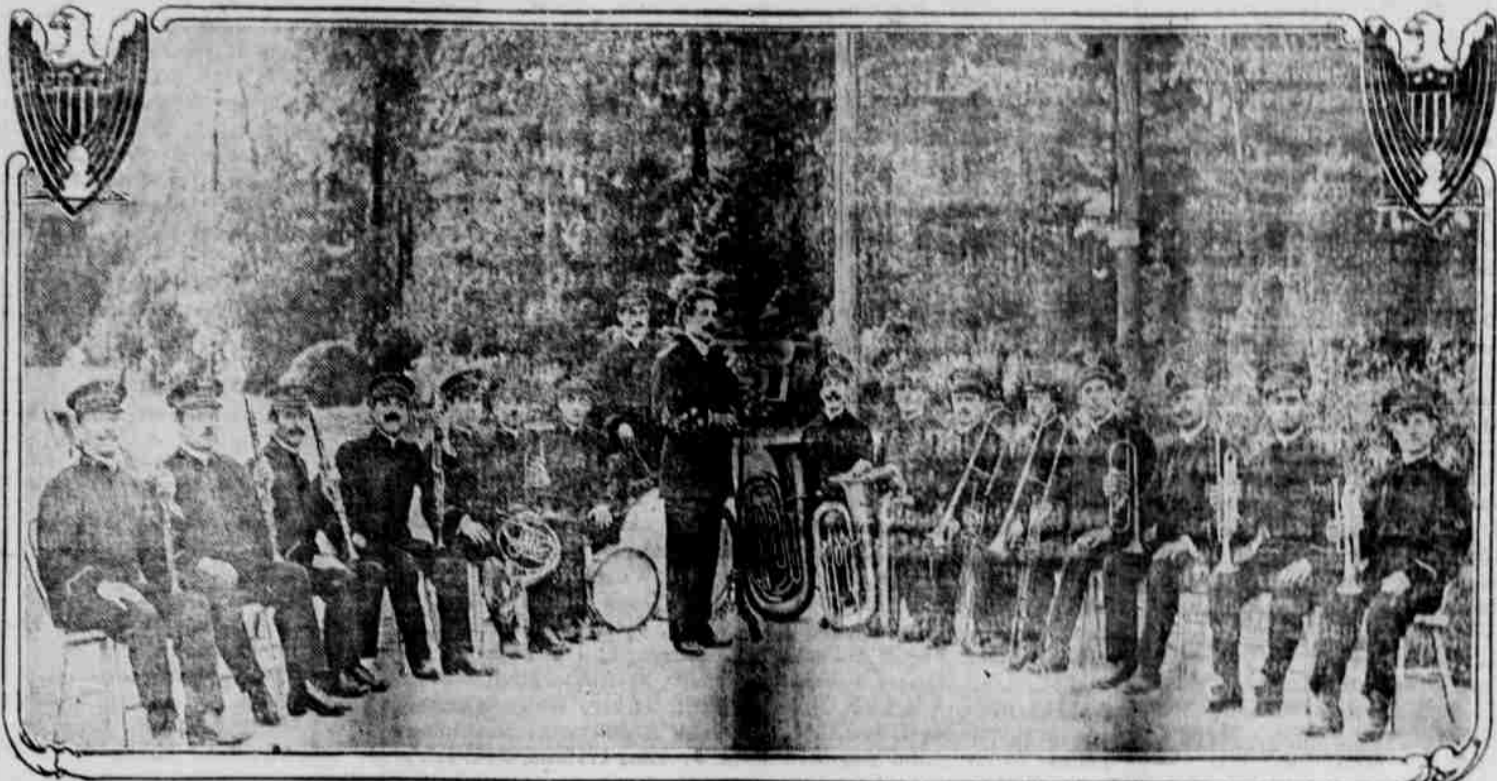

Chautauqua Audiences to Hear New York City Marine Band



Two years ago the New York City Marine Band made a tour of the West and were enthusiastically received by the music-loving audiences in the larger cities. This is the same band which for several seasons past has been in such demand for conventions and big gatherings in the East and has achieved an unusual record for repeated engagements at Pallasades Park in New York. The director, Mario Lo Zito, is one of America's foremost band leaders, the oldest brother and most widely known of the famous Italian family of that name. The soloist with the band is to be Mary Adel Hays, the New York coloratura soprano, who captivated Chautauqua audiences last year. Miss Hays has been returned as soloist on the express request of town after town. WAR SAVINGS NEWS

Friday, June 28th, at 8 p. m. is the time set for Washington County to "go over the top" in War Savings. The people of Washington County are asked to set aside \$534,000 to be spent after the war is won. In the meantime let the money work to support our boys and our allies at the front. Each district has been assigned its share on a basis of assessed valuation and population. A district is "over the top" when its quota of W. S. S. has been purchased or pledged. Everyone is expected to help as much as he is able. Nearly every district has men or women who can take the limit \$1000 in W. S. S. Others can take \$500 or more. Don't wait for the committee to come to see you and work their heads off to get you to pledge your share. Get right around and see the committee and pledge more than your share and encourage others to pledge liberally. Solomon was absolutely correct when he laid down the principle that a man's heart and his treasure would be in the same place. Investments of time and money are the tests of patriotism. Talk is cheap, but it takes money, provisions and ships to win the war. The sum of \$83,400 fills a War Savings Certificate. The money helps the government. The material that you would spend it for is kept for the government. So you have really helped win the war doubly, that is to say \$166,800 worth. In five years you get \$100. A profit of \$12.60 for the use of \$83.40 four years and six months. In all human probability prices will have swung back to normal or below by that time and your \$100 then will buy at least twice as much of anything you want as the \$83.40 would buy now. You stand a good chance to make 100 per cent. on your investment, so don't get to feeling too sorry for yourself about the duty of buying W. S. S. The more you buy the better for you. During the week June 17th to 22nd a series of patriotic rallies will be held over the county. There are people in your neighborhood who have not attended a patriotic meeting. Urge them to go to one of these rallies.

The Chautauqua's dates for Hillsboro are July 18 to 23, inclusive. EICHHORNS LEAD COMMUNITY SINGING Chautauquas to Hear Pioneers in Great Movement That is Sweeping the Country. The first National Community Sing Day was celebrated in Washington last December and thousands were turned away from the great Auditorium. THE ADVANTAGE OF A HANDICAP

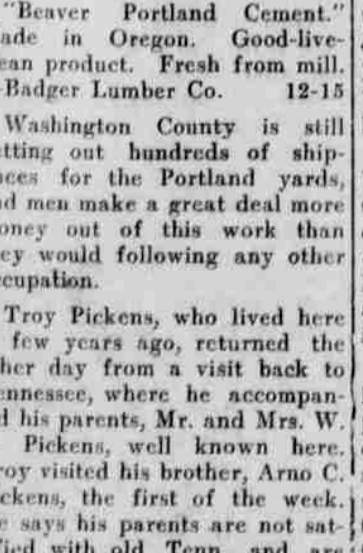
