#### PROCLAMATION

For the first time in history the President of the United States is calling together by Proclamation all citizens of the United States at one time, June 28, 1918, to meet a personal responsibility in time of war through the War Savings movement.

A crisis is before the Nation, and the people are called to rally to a duty imposed upon us because of war. There can be no excuses. Therefore we must obey the call to meet our full duty.

The Proclamation—Washington, D. C., June 1, 1918. To the People of the United States:

I earnestly appeal to every man, woman and child to pledge on or before June 28th to save constantly and to buy as regularly as possible the securities of the Government, and to do this as far as possible through membership in War Savings Societies. June 28th is this special period of enlistment in the great volunteer army of production and saving at home. May there be no unexcused on that date.

#### MUST SERVE SENTENCE

The Supreme Court last Monday handed down a decision affirming Judge Geo. R. Bagley in the case of State versus Rosa Merlo, convicted of killing her husband, Joseph Merlo. The case has dragged along for over two years and this ends the chapter. There were 32 assignments of error in the appeal, but the Court held that there was none fatal to a just trial of the case. This means that Mrs. Merlo must serve the sentence imposed upon her, which was from 1 to 15 years.

The case was prosecuted by District Attorney E. B. Tongue, and Mrs. Merlo was defended by H. T. Bagley and S. B. Huston.

#### INQUEST HELD

Coroner Limber this morning held an inquest to inquire into the cause of death of Howard Brooks, killed Tuesday evening. The jury, after hearing all the evidence found that death was due to injuries received while attempting to board a moving train. No responsibility for the accident was attached to the train crew. #### TWO POUNDS SUGAR

Local merchants will now sell but two pounds of sugar at each sale for domestic purposes. If you want to put up fruit then you can buy more, but at the time of purchase one must sign a certificate declaring that it will be used for that purpose only. People from out in the country can buy five pounds at a purchase for domestic or table use.

Deputy A. H. Davis, of the local postoffice, reports that at noon today ten alien German women had registered under the latest regulations. This will mean, in the 32 county postoffices, that in the neighborhood of 60 or 70 will have registered when the time expires on the evening of June 26.

The S. P. and O. E. lines between Eugene and Portland, have been unified by the government, and the rolling stock of railways has been made a common unit for shipping purposes. The branch to Forest Grove, so far, has not come under this latest governmental order, but it would not be surprising were it made a unit system. Much expense could be saved by the procedure.

Albert Hartrampf has sold a new Senior Nilsen tractor to the Ladd & Reed Farm. The order was placed by W. H. McDeldowney, and the machine is now enroute from the East. The tractor is bought to replace one already on the farm, and the Nilsen Senior will surely make good in more ways than one. The Ladd & Reed Farm is one of the largest in the county, and scarcity of farm labor makes a tractor a necessity.

Harry Dick Reynolds, of Idaho, was picked up by Sheriff Alexander this week, charged with evading the draft law. The young man says that he tried to get his questionnaire two different times, and the sheriff of his county in Idaho has wired that he will send immediate induction papers here so he can go with the first shipment out of here June 26. Reynolds has been cutting wood here for several months.

#### COUNTY AGENT NOTES

A Soil Survey of Washington County soils is now in progress, by the U. S. Bureau of Soils co-operating with O. A. C. E. C. Eckman represents the U. S. Bureau of Soils, and C. V. Ruzek the college.

The chief aim in making this survey is the classification of all the different soil types in the area, and the mapping of same. Borings are made to a depth of three feet, so that not only is the surface soil classified, but also the sub-surface and the sub-soil. A map is made of the county showing all the areas of each soil type, and the map will also show roads, streams, railroads, and canals.

The value of the survey will be in the fact that all data regarding soil type is collected; the fertilizers that have given best results, and the cropping systems that have been most successful. In the future when any question arises regarding any farm in the county, as to crop to plant or fertilizer to be used, etc., by referring to the map the soil type on that farm is noted and the experience of all the farmers having the same type of soil is at once available.

Mole Pool a Success—More than 1000 Mole pellets were brought to the office of the

County Agent the past week, and they have been sold at an average of 30 cents each, the better ones bringing 40 cents. This with the bounty paid by the county, makes the boys and girls of this county richer by more than \$400. Another pool of pellets will be made in a few weeks.

Most of the pellets have arrived in a fine condition, but some will still have to be a little more careful. Despite warnings to the contrary, some of the pellets have been "cashed" when the dealers say they want them "open." Neither should the pellets be salted. During this weather, care must be taken that the pellet is removed as soon as possible after the mole is trapped, as the longer the delay the looser becomes the fur.

#### THIRTY TONS FLOUR

Hillsboro, Oregon, June 18.

The Argus—As a result of the patriotic action of the retail dealers and many of the good people of Washington County, we are this week loading over thirty tons of flour which is being turned over to the Government for export to the army and the Allies.

An 80,000 lb capacity car was set in at Gaston, Monday, transferred to Forest Grove Tuesday, and to Hillsboro yesterday, for loading the stocks of flour which were concentrated at those points.

We believe that Washington County will make a showing in this matter which will compare very favorably with any county in the state.

Many instances have come to our notice where families having less than one sack of wheat flour in the house have turned it in. The moral strength which such expressions of genuine loyalty lend to those who fight our battles and steer the ship of state, is worth many times the food value of the flour, great as that is just now.

It is such citizenry as this that makes it possible for this country to face a situation such as was shown by the Food Survey, May 1, without despair. That survey showed a visible supply of 23 million bushels of wheat against 58 million bushels on May 1, 1917, this not including flour stock. Think of it! Under ordinary conditions that would spell panic, with the consumer paying \$25, \$35, perhaps \$50, per barrel for flour. But what happened? Except that we had to eat some bread that didn't look natural, and eat more spuds and "garden sass" nothing serious developed so far as we can see. But something happened to old General Consumption (consumption of wheat)—he dropped to about 25 per cent of his size in May, 1917, and as a result the export of food stuff "rambled right along." This is a result that ought to make eating hay agreeable to the real loyal American. The American people can do any old thing if they think it is needed.

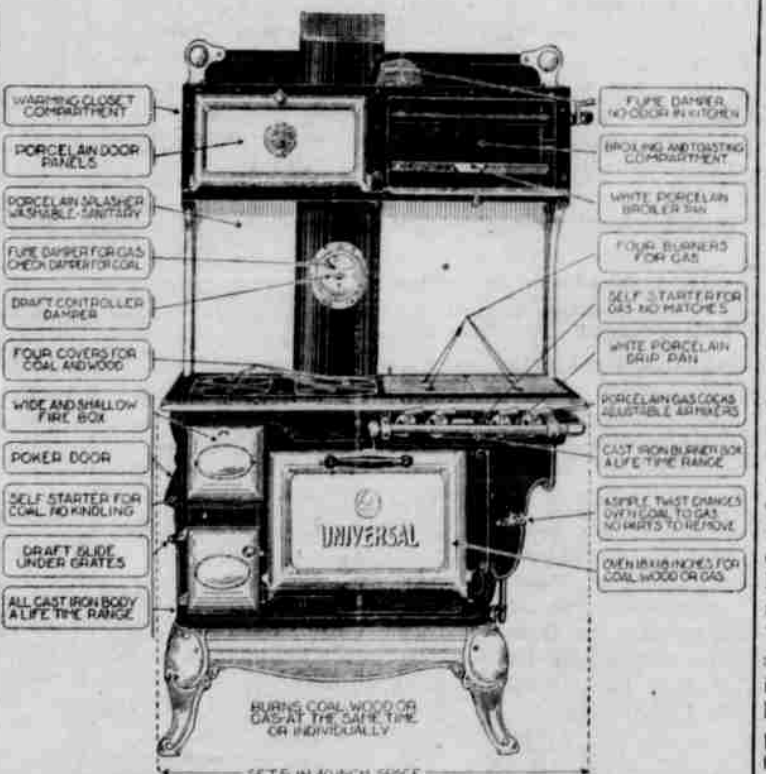
