### NO LEMONADE

If you wish to be patriotic on the Fourth of July this year, don't drink lemonade or other sweetened drinks, or eat candy. This new way of celebrating the national holiday is suggested by the Food Administration, which is making an urgent appeal, just now, for the saving of sugar in all possible ways to make up for the sugar losses resulting from submarine sinkings, and to help build up the necessary reserve for domestic and factory canning.

In order to save the sugar that would otherwise be consumed at picnics and celebrations on July 4 through the medium of lemonade, orangeade, etc., the Food Administration has decided to refuse all permits for sugar to be used for such purposes on that day.

"Hundreds of men and boys are applying for such permits,"

said Assistant Federal Food Administrator W. K. Newell, in making the announcement, "and if sugar permits were given to all these, the sugar consumed in lemonade and other sweetened drinks would, in the aggregate, be very substantial. We have very impressive evidence of the urgent need of saving sugar every possible way in our new restriction which limits the sale of sugar to two pounds at a time to the consumer, and it would certainly be an absurdity, in the face of this restriction, to permit the use of hundreds of pounds of sugar in lemonades sold at picnics and other celebrations on the day of all days when we should be patriotic in every word, thought and deed."

### DRAFT SLACKERS

Portland, June 18—Federal authorities are getting ready to institute a merciless campaign to run down and punish a new form of draft slacker.

This new slacker is the draft registrant who has been granted deferred classification at the time of his registration, but whose status since has so changed that no longer is entitled to exemption, yet who remains silent about this change in the hope it will be overlooked.

There are estimated to be hundreds of such cases in Oregon, and thousands of them in the United States. Suspicion particularly has been directed against a great many of the deferred classifications granted for industrial reasons.

It now appears that the status of many of these men is not the same as when they were granted deferred classification. Yet they have failed to notify their local boards and continue to enjoy exemption from military service. In some cases, also, the original classification was not justified.

Many cases where deferred classification was granted for dependency also have changed in status, but the registrant has not notified his local board.

With the time at hand when the need for manpower is so urgent that every available man must either "work or fight," and when lower classifications are to be revised in order to make more men available for Class I, this form of evading military service will not be tolerated.

The draft regulations are very plain and blunt in prescribing the penalty for failure on the part of a man granted deferred classification to notify his local board at once if his status is changed:

"Every registrant shall, within five days after the happening thereof, report to his local board any fact which might change or affect his classification," says Section 116 of the Regulations.

"Failure to report change of status as herein required, or making a false report thereof, is misdemeanor punishable by one year's imprisonment."

The campaign to run down these draft slackers will be started soon, and it will be a rigorous campaign. Men guilty of evading military service by failure to report when they should be reclassified, need look for no mercy.

"Every patriotic registrant who has been granted deferred classification, but whose status has changed so that he is no longer entitled to that classification, will report the change immediately to his local board," said Captain John E. Cullison, in charge of the draft law in the office of the Adjutant General.

### THAT COUNTY FAIR

Sherwood, Ore., June 17, 1918. To the Editor:

As some criticism has arisen over naming Forest Grove as the location for the County Fair this year, I would like to explain why this action was taken by the executive board. I went to this meeting fully expecting to vote for Hillsboro as the logical place for holding the County Fair, but when I learned that there are a large number of sheds on the campus at Forest Grove, as well as the shelving for the displays, and when I learned that it would probably cost \$1000 to tear those sheds down and move all the material to some other location; and considering the shortness of the time, and the need for economy, I felt it was best to hold the Fair at Forest Grove this year.

I am strongly in favor of securing a permanent location near Hillsboro and erecting permanent buildings there. I am sure the Executive Board stands ready to reconsider their decision in locating the Fair at Forest Grove this year, if a majority of the people of the County want it somewhere else. For this reason we hope to get a full expression of opinion from all parts of the county. We realize that to be a success the Fair must have the support of all the County, and we do not want it thought that it is a one town affair. The executive board feels that it must know whether the county is behind us in our choice of a location for this year. Also we will be glad to receive suggestions as to features of the Fair. Mail your letters to the County Agent, or the Argus, and don't forget that in helping the farmer to grow better crops, the County Fair will help win the war.
