The 4-5 weeks codling moth spray should be put on at once if omitted till now, and if plant lice are present Black Leaf 40 should be added, 3/4 pint to 100 gallon spray. Prunes attacked by aphids, bud moth and twig miners need Black Leaf 40, 3/4 pint to 100 gallons water and 4 pounds fish oil soap. Cherry trees, and pears not sprayed for moth, should be dusted or sprayed with lead arsenate if attacked by slugs.—A. L. Lovett, O. A. C.
