HARBISON GETS THOUSAND DOLLARS

Jury Awarded Plaintiff One-Fifth What was Asked in Court

HARD TRIED CASE ENDS

Dozen Witnesses on Each Side, and Some Legal Battle was Held

R. E. Harbison was this morning given damages for \$1,000 against the city of Hillsboro by a verdict returned in circuit court by a jury. The case has been fought since last Wednesday, and the original complaint asked for \$5,000, damages alleged to have been sustained by virtue of the sewer overflow from the sewer and septic tank. The court held that Harbison could collect for but two years out of the six, as Harbison has slept on his right of suit.

There were a dozen witnesses on each side, and the case was hotly contested on each side. The jury was out from yesterday afternoon until ten o'clock this morning, when a verdict was reached.

They were paroled under condition that they pay \$100 of the fine and report to the court monthly, also to remain away from each other. W. J. Gregg, civil suit, vs. Fairbanks-Morse Co., verdict for Mr. Gregg.

ALFALFA

"Alfalfa is the leading irrigated crop," says W. L. Powers, professor of irrigation and drainage in the Oregon Agricultural College. "It grows rapidly and throughout the entire season, yielding heavily. Alfalfa adds nitrogen and humus to the soil, is deep-rooting, loosens the subsoil, drawing up plant food elements from the sub-strata. It is a fairly permanent crop and the cost of production is therefore moderate. Alfalfa cures well under the arid conditions and provides nitrogenous substances in plentiful amounts to make it practically a balanced food. The plant makes a good hay or pasture for all kinds of stock and makes a valuable seed crop under certain conditions. Its use is being extended some by grinding."

RED CROSS

Thro the efforts of Mrs. D. N. Cochran, Mrs. E. H. White and Mrs. Richard Hornby a very successful Red Cross benefit was given at Cochrane last week and \$69 was turned in for the local fund. It is to be hoped that an auxiliary will soon be formed there and at Timber.

Mountaineer Auxiliary organized May 19, and has made a fine showing of work and donations. Members have loaned sewing machines so that 10 hospital bed shirts and 9 jackets have been made. The donations are 73 holders; 72 handkerchiefs; 103 napkins; 101 wash cloths; 7 dish rags; 11 dish towels and \$2.75 worth of Red Cross pins have been sold. Mrs. Mays has donated \$3 which she earned on the election board, and another member has given \$1.

Junior Red Cross Work The Junior Red Cross work in the county, under the Hillsboro branch, has been shipped to Portland in 5 large boxes. Considering the organization was but a short time ago, the great amount of work carried on by the schools during the past term, and the fact that the teachers knew little about Junior work at the beginning, the result was more than satisfactory. Enthusiasm on the part of the teachers and pupils, and assistance by the Senior Red Cross have contributed to the success.

In some districts work will continue thro the summer under the supervision of the Senior Red Cross auxiliaries and in other cases where the teachers reside in the districts work will be continued under their direction.

At the beginning of the Autumn term it is planned to have a conference in Hillsboro consisting of all teachers and chairmen of auxiliaries at which they will meet Mrs. Blumauer, State chairman of the Junior Red Cross, who will outline the scope various aspects of the work. Junior work suggested for the summer are mittens made of canvas, overall materials or suiting, for nearby men in the Spruce divisions. The patterns will be sent on application to the Hillsboro branch.

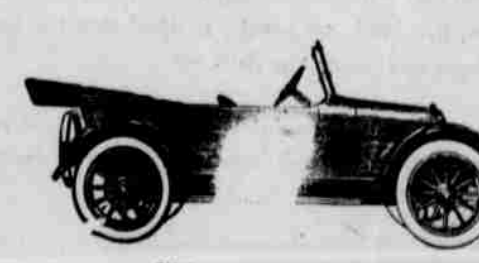
