

PROMINENT PIONEER PASSES AT GASTON

Thos. W. Sain, Stockman and Ranchman, Died Tuesday

FINE TYPE OF CHARACTER

Crossed Plains in 1864, and Settled in County in 1865

Thos. W. Sain died at his home in Scroggin Valley, June 25, 1918, after an illness covering several months. He was the son of Philip H. and Naomia Sain, and he was born in Hazelgreen, Iowa, Oct. 28, 1851. He came to the coast with his parents in 1864, settling for a short time in Idaho. In 1865 he came to Washington County, and this has been his home for 53 years.

Mr. Sain was married to Miss Alice J. Smith, Sept. 20, 1875—a daughter of the late Darling Smith, pioneer of 1848. When he was married he had 320 acres of land above Gaston, and there were four acres cleared. By acreage and persistence he cleared this up until he had one of the finest farms in Washington County. He enlarged his holdings to a section of land later and built up a beautiful home.

He principally raised stock and his herd of Shorthorns was the pride of the valley for many years.

He was always interested in school affairs and local politics, and for years served on the district board and was also road supervisor—many times when he did not want the position.

He was a member of the Knights of Pythias, Odd Fellows, W. O. W. and Elk.

Sain was highly respected by a large circle of friends and was perhaps one of the best known characters in West Washington County. His word was as good as his bond, and he was highly esteemed for his sterling qualities.

The funeral takes place today. He leaves the widow and the following children:
