LATE CARROLL GATES WRITES FROM HOSPITAL

Says Three Days at Front Were Full of Thrills and Shrapnel

WROTE CHEERFUL MISSIVE

Wounded in Left Eye With Machine Gun Bullet

The late Carroll Gates wrote his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Gates, and sister, Olive, after he was wounded on the French front, and in the Base Hospital. He wrote June 7, and a part of his missive follows:

"Well, I'm in the hospital now so have all sorts of time for letter writing. I had bad luck at the front; was in the trenches only three days when Fritz got me. Those three days were full of thrills, tho, believe me—bar-rages, gas, shrapnel. I soon got so I didn't care what happened. One afternoon I was helping carry a wounded man in when I was hit by a machine gun bullet. I thought it was 'finis' for me at first; I thought of home and wondered if I would ever see Mother, Father and Sis again. I was able to walk to the first aid station, where they patched me up. The bullet got me right in the left eye so I won't be able to see quite so well as before. I am feeling fine—my eye doesn't hurt at all.

This is a nice hospital, nice soft beds, real pillows—reminds me of home. The band is now giving a concert outside, and the music is so catchy I want to get up and dance. We feed pretty good here, but, oh, how I wish I could help you eat those strawberries, shortcakes, raspberries, Logans, etc. Just wait till I get home—I'll make up for what I've missed. I wish I knew how Mildred (his brother) is faring. Please write soon. Your loving Son."

Editor's note—The writer died a few days after this letter was written.

CHERRY GROVE

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Forest Grove, Ore., on July 27, 1918, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Cherry Grove, and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$309 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at eighteen years, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks, Form 1753 and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

Miss Pubols was a universal favorite in a large circle of young people in the West Union and Bethany sections.

Her sudden death was a shock to the entire community. She was ambitious and possessed of a sweet disposition and a determination to succeed. She received her Grammar school education at West Union, graduated from Lincoln High, and then concluded she would train at St. Vincent's Hospital for a graduate nurse. She commenced her studies there last September. Illness caused her to return to the West Union home. She was a bright student, and was beloved by all her intimate friends. She was a member of the Bethany Baptist church, and at the obsequies Miss Anna Graf sang a solo, "Sometime We'll Understand." The pall bearers were Ben Graf, Theo. Rich, Mark Rich, Paul Graf, Herman and Albert Smith. The floral offerings were beautiful and expressive of the tender regard in which Miss Pubols was held, as well as a tribute to her splendid character.

The Fourth of July in Hillsboro, under auspices of the Red Cross, was safe and sane, and attended by a large crowd. There was community singing and two splendid speeches. Rev. Skipworth read the immortal document upon which our liberties are based, and W. F. Woodward, of Portland, spoke in the forenoon, and Prof. A. B. Patten, of Forest Grove, in the afternoon. Both speeches were splendidly patriotic, and struck a new note in national ideals.

The Laurel and Iowa Hill bands furnished the music, assisted by the G. A. R. Five and Drum Corps, and all worked to give the best of programs.

A series of tableaux by the Eastern Star, under the direction of Mrs. Glen Payne, in the afternoon, was a feature of the program. The first part depicted the different phases of Red Cross work, aid to the wounded soldiers, aid to the Belgian refugees, and the Juniors, with their knitting. The last half exemplified the spirit of 1876, the spirit of 1861, and the ideals of 1918. Soldiers assisted in the last part, and a feature was a soldier in the present war, and a sailor now in service.
