Insurance will be paid in the sum of \$400. The loss to Lichty amounts to over a thousand dollars.

MEMORIAL SERVICE

Sunday morning last, at the First Congregational Church, the Memorial Service for the late C. Carroll Gates was held, and the church was taxed beyond its capacity by those who desired to pay loving tribute to the promoted soldier, and respect and sympathy to the bereaved parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Gates. The decorations of the church were American flags and gold and yellow flowers to denote the turning of a blue flag into one of gold. The music was appropriate and well rendered, G. V. Payne presiding at the organ. The memorial address by Dr. A. D. Shaw was entitled, "The Day Dawn." Dr. Shaw stated in part: "At this Memorial Service in honor of one of our own, please let me tell you that this life would be an enigma unless it were succeeded by another life, fadeless, deathless, ageless. Unless this life is but a prelude to a larger, fuller life beyond the Great Divide, then I fail to see the purposes of God in it. Have I no message to give the Fathers and mothers whose boys are at the front? Whose boys are dying? Whose boys are dead? Must their lives bloom for a day, then pass away, and be eternally buried under the waves of extinct finality? Was it for this they gave their fresh young lives upon the altar of love and duty? Dead and ended! 'No! American fathers and mothers, ten thousand times, no! Ring it to the Heavens, ye earth; ring it back from the heavens to earth—they live! Eternally live as conscious sons of the Lord God Almighty. Why? A miracle, you say? No, give us the hope of reason why, then, in order to comfort our bereaved hearts. They live, and shall forever live. Because death cannot claim life. Because life is stronger than death. Because man is divine and therefore deathless and ageless and timeless. Because when the blackness of night passes, the Day Dawn arises, the Day Dawn of the eternal ages, for all who fulfilled these eternal words, 'Greater Love Hath no Man Than This, That a Man Laid Down His Life for His Friends.' This is the Day Dawn."

DRAINAGE AT ROY

A number of farmers near Roy met July 10, on the farms of Mr. King and Mr. Parsons with Prof. W. L. Powers, of Corvallis, to study the problems of drainage on the farms.

The particular problem in this case was the matter of getting an adequate outlet for drainage waters.

Prof. Powers ran levels on the areas and thus enabled the farmers to decide upon the possible location for their drains.

The Agricultural College, through the County Agent, will give similar assistance in any community where six or more farmers are interested.

R. F. RICE

R. F. Rice, well known here as Frank Rice, a former resident of North Hillsboro, died at his home at No. 537 East 31st St., Portland, July 15, 1918, after a short illness. Mr. Rice was out to Hillsboro and Blooming a few weeks ago, and while not rugged was considered in fair health. He was born in Platte County, Mo., April 23, 1838, and when a boy moved with his parents to Illinois, where he remained until he was 21 years of age, when he crossed the plains to Oregon, arriving in the Fall of 1859. He settled first near Dilley, and was married in 1873 to Katie Gibson, a daughter of pioneer W. O. Gibson, founder of the Dilley townsite, and manufacturer of flour, the first miller to locate in the county. The wife died about 1881, and to them were born four children—Otto P., of Portland, with the Lilly Seed Co.; E. E. Rice, and W. E. Rice, now farming near Blooming; and Lara, who died at the age of seven years.

The body was brought to the Donelson Undertaking parlors, Monday, and the funeral took place from the M. E. church on Wednesday.

Mr. Rice was a man of high ideals, a sturdy friend and a good neighbor. The affection of his children testify to his worth as a father, and a host of friends around Hillsboro and in the county deplore his taking off.

FIDELIA M. BURRHUS

Mrs. Fidelia M. Burrhus, of below the Minter Bridge, died at the home of her son, Frank Wallace, three miles southeast of Hillsboro, at 3:30 o'clock P. M., Monday, July 15, 1918, after being in feeble health for several years. Her maiden name was Fidelia Straight, and she was born in Onondaga County, N. Y., Jan. 14, 1835, and was married in Indiana in 1854 to Thos. Wallace, who died Dec. 28, 1860. She was married to A. P. Burrhus in Boone, Iowa, in 1869. She is survived by Mrs. A. M. A. Miller, of Angola, Indiana, and Frank Wallace, of south of this city. Two children are deceased—Wm. J. and Rose.

She came to Oregon in 1897, from Huron, South Dakota. Since the death of Mr. Burrhus, Jan. 31, 1907, she has made her home with Mr. Wallace.

She was a half-sister of Mrs. H. L. Frost, at Atlantic Iowa. Eleven grandchildren and sixteen great grandchildren survive her.

The funeral took place at 3:30 this afternoon from the Donelson Undertaking Parlors, and interment was in the Masonic Cemetery, by the side of her late husband, Mr. Burrhus.
