

SELECTIVE DRAFT TO BE PRE-DRILLED

Government Makes New Department
for War Period

TO EXPLAIN ALL THINGS
Encourages Registrants to Join
Local Militia

The various local draft boards throughout the country have just been notified, through a leaflet from the Provost Marshal General at Washington of a method for bringing personal instruction to each selective service man by means of local boards of instruction to be appointed by the draft boards.

These boards of instruction are to be composed of thoroughly patriotic and capable citizens of each community. It is intended that they shall do more than instruct. For instance, the members of the instruction boards will endeavor to ascertain and clear up all the perplexities that may beset the registrant, and to be of practical assistance to him in every way.

The first meeting of registrants for instruction, the leaflet suggests, might well be at the time of the medical examination. The registrants may be assembled in small groups for personal interviews, it is suggested, and encouraging suggestions made to them as to the personal value of military training and of outdoor life, the chances for promotion, the aid and friendly support of the Red Cross, the Army Knights of Columbus, the Y. M. C. A., the Hebrew Welfare Board, and the Commission on Training Camp Activities.

Prior to their induction, it is planned that the men shall be called together once or twice by order of the local draft board, to meet in groups for instruction in the following subjects:

(a) The provision which the Government has made for the protection and welfare of disabled soldiers and, in the event of death, of their families and dependents, through its War Risk Insurance Bureau.

(b) The Government provision for allowances and allotments to soldiers' dependents, these provisions being so liberal that the soldier can rest assured his dependents will be amply cared for.

(c) Discussion of such topics as "Why America Entered the War," "Why America Must Win the War," "The Necessary Character of the American Soldier," "Sexual Restraint and the Avoidance of Liquor as a Patriotic Obligation," "Camp Life," etc.

The Government is encouraging draft registrants wherever possible to enter local militia reserve organizations in their communities for drill. It has been found that this work actually places the men a month or so ahead in capacity to become efficient soldiers, and of course the well drilled man has a much better opportunity of obtaining quick promotion than the man who has to begin at the beginning and learn everything after he enters the service. The Hillsboro militia offers a fine chance for pre-drilling.

Ship Building Contracts Are Result of Schwab's Visit

SPRUCE CUT IS BIG THING

What Old Oregon is Doing in Industrial Lines

From a payroll point of view, the aeroplane spruce operations in the Pacific Northwest have suddenly leaped into the same class as the shipbuilding industry. There are 25,000 workmen in the shipyards of Oregon and Southwestern Washington, and nearly that same number of soldiers and civilians getting out aeroplane spruce.

Portland has promise of \$200,000,000 in shipbuilding contracts as result of visit from Director General Schwab of the Fleet Corporation.

Oregon Industrial Commission cost since it started Nov. 1, 1914, \$279,143.

Hood River—Apple production which amounted to 1,300 cars in 1917 is estimated at about 1,500 cars for 1918.

Scio milk condensary reopens, paying \$2.75 per 100 for milk. Oregon has bumper prune crop—trees breaking down.

Portland issues Food Administration rules to the state, yet one firm turns 10,000 pounds skinned milk into the sewers daily.

North Bend—J. A. Allen to erect modern apartment house.

Pendleton will add vocational department building to high school.

Portland gets \$6,000 paper board factory building.

Coquille—Johnson mill, pay roll \$50,000 a month, to be rebuilt.

Marshfield — Third federal ship launched here.

Corvallis — Construction work well under way on new barracks buildings for use of 500 men receiving special military training at Oregon Agricultural College. In all 350,000 feet of lumber used.

Brownsville cannery packed 28,000 pounds cherries in three days.

Astoria — Crown-Willamette Paper Co. has acquired 3,000 acres adjoining the Young's River falls and will build a large dam and power plant capable of developing 2,000 horsepower, to be used in a paper mill which will operate at that point.

Dallas—Prune packing plant being enlarged to double capacity.

Portland—Standifer shipbuilding corporation will erect \$350,000 hotel and 100 cottages and bungalows to accommodate 1,000 of its laboring people.

Medford—Anderson gold mine on Wagner Creek leased by Seattle parties.

La Grande offering free site for dehydrating plant.

Logging output is increased 750,000 to 1,000,000 feet daily over April.

Tax commissioner announces no increase in assessed valuations.

Portland labor unions to construct \$75,000 labor temple.

Astoria to have new \$28,000 fireproof building.

Marshfield puts up \$20,000 bond and donates site for armory.

There is a big acreage of grain cut, and threshing is started in some places. The harvest is a good two weeks earlier than in 1917. Everywhere comes the pre-harvest report that winter wheat is going to turn out considerably better than was expected several weeks ago.

On July 29 the war board will send 8 men to Vancouver to the spruce division—all limited service men. The following have entered their voluntary offer to go: Claude C. Miller, Herman Luck, Chas. Nichtman, Sylvester Wolf (who wants to go to France if he can enlist rather than to Vancouver), Arthur Stark, Chas. Richter and Ernest A. Johnson. Thirteen men will be sent to Camp Fremont, Cal., Aug. 5.

The regulations on military requirements are undergoing constant changes. A few weeks ago, and a man was rejected if he did not measure up to the minimum of five feet and three inches in height and did not weigh 116 pounds. Today, if a man be fit physically and is five feet tall, and weighs 110 pounds, he is Class A. 1 and will be inducted into the army. This means that if any have been rejected under the old measurement and weight they may now be called on to enter the service.
