He, in his time, shod some of Oregon's best, and he knew how, having been one of the best shoers in the Northwest. For many years he plied his trade in Cornelius and Hillsboro, and he was a king among mechanics.

Joseph Downs passed away at the Smith Hospital, Tuesday afternoon, August 6, 1918. While not a pioneer, he was long identified with the growth and business activities of this city, and Hillsboro suffers a distinct loss in his passing. He had been ill for several years, and altho the end was not expected, he was able to be upon the streets, converse with friends, and transact business until last Saturday.

Mr. Downs was born in Toronto, Canada, November 6, 1856, being one of seven children, four girls and three boys. He remained in his native country until he came to Oregon in 1882, settling in Hillsboro in 1885, where he has since made his home. He was married in Cornelius, Oregon, to Miss Minnie E. McCourt, January 2, 1884, and to their union a son, Ward W. Downs, was born. Widow and son survive.

The funeral was held at the family home on Main street, at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, the services being conducted by Rev. A. D. Shaw, of the Congregational Church, after which the remains were deposited in the local cemetery, west of the city.

The services, in every detail, were carried out in accordance with the wishes of the deceased, expressed but a few days before, and were unostentatious, his passing and placing to final rest being in keeping with the quiet life he had led.

He was a firm believer in a Supreme Being, but did not regard membership in a religious organization essential to eternal happiness. He was honest and upright in all of his dealings and associations; quiet and reserved, but took an active part in political and civil affairs and took much pride in assisting in the upbuilding of the city in which he made his home. His life was clean and he believed in fair dealing. This was his religion—the way he thought one should live to prepare for the passing, and to this thought he was conscientious and faithful.

JOHN A. VANDEHEY

John A. Vandehy, of Centerville, died at his home August 5, 1918, after a lingering illness. He was born in Wisconsin, Aug. 26, 1869, and came to Oregon with his parents in 1876, and has resided here ever since. He was married to Alberdina Jansen, on August 26, 1898. The widow and the following children survive—Anthony, Louise, Walter, Elmer, Marion, Irene, Robert and Norman, Everett having died in infancy. He leaves the following brothers and sisters—Frank, Martin and Peter Vandehy; Mrs. E. Wills, Mrs. Peter Vandenberg, Mrs. Frank Heesacker, Mrs. A. T. Anderson, and Sister M. Inoda. The funeral took place today at 9:30 from the Verboort Catholic Church. Deceased was a member of Glencoe Lodge No. 22, K. of P.

Mr. Vandehy was a good citizen, and had many friends in Washington County who deplore his untimely death and extend a world of sympathy to the bereaved family.

"We are indebted to Major Gillespie for a steak of Confederate beef alias meat. We have tried it, and can assure our friends that if it is rendered necessary, they need have no scruples at eating the meat. It is sweet, savory and tender, and so long as we have a mule left we are satisfied our soldiers will be content to subsist on it.

"Grant's forces did a little firing on Tuesday afternoon, but the balance of that day was comparatively quiet. Yesterday morning they were still and continued so until early in the afternoon, when they sprung a mine on the left of our center, and opened fire along the line for some distance. We have not been able to ascertain anything definitely as to our loss, but as our officers were on the lookout for this move of the enemy, the expectations of the Yankees were not realized by a great deal."

"The Yanks outside our city are considerably on the sick list. Fever, dysentery and disgust are their companions, and Grant is deserting daily and are crossing the river in the region of Warren, cursing Grant and abolitionists generally. The boys are down upon the earth delving, the burrowing, the bad water and the hot weather."
