ADJUTANT GENERAL SENDS OUT NOTICE

Explains Status of Registration for Saturday, August 24

PENALTY TO BE HEAVY

Alien and Citizen, Who Reached 21 Since June 5, Must Sign Up

The Adjutant General has sent out the following notice to the press for the registration which takes place this Saturday at the court house in Hillsboro. All such should carefully read the following circular, which is official:

"Who Must Register—All male persons (citizens or aliens) born between June 6, 1897, and August 24, 1897, both dates inclusive, except officers and enlisted men of the regular army, navy and marine corps, and the national guard while in federal service, and officers in Officers' Reserve Corps, and enlisted men in Enlisted Reserve Corps while in active service.

"When—On Saturday, August 24, 1918, between 7 a. m. and 9 p. m.

"Where—At office of local board having jurisdiction where person to be registered permanently resides, or other place designated by that local board.

"How—Go in person on August 24 to your registration place. If you expect to be absent from home on August 24, go at once to the office of the local board where you happen to be. Have your registration card filled out and certified. Mail it to the local board having jurisdiction where you permanently reside. Enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope, with your registration card, for the return of your registration certificate. Failure to get this certificate may cause you serious inconvenience. You must mail your registration card in time to reach your home local board on August 24. If you are sick on August 24 and unable to present yourself in person, send some competent friend. The clerk may deputize him or her to prepare your card.

"Information—If you are in doubt as to what to do or where to register, consult your local board.

"Penalty for Not Registering—Failure to register is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for one year. It may result in loss of valuable rights and privileges and immediate induction into military service.

"Caution—Do not confuse this call for registration, which is only for men who have reached their 21st birthday since June 5, with the coming registration of men from 18 to 20, and from 32 to 45, inclusive, which will be held sometime early in September."

COAST LEADS EAST ON SHIP BUILDING

Schwab Discovers That West Distances Atlantic Firms

NEW DRY DOCK, PORTLAND

One Hundred Twenty Seven Cars Lumber Shipped in Day

With a view of speeding up ship construction in the East, Director-General Schwab calls Eastern shipbuilders in conference at Philadelphia. Production in East has lagged behind that on Pacific Coast and Mr. Schwab proposes to give Eastern builders the benefit of what he learned on his recent trip to the West.

Salem—The Consolidation Commission approves report of Prof. J. M. Mathews, government efficiency expert. The approval as to details is not yet complete. Thus far the contemplated plan of consolidating commissions and cutting state expense will make an estimated saving of \$830,506 in two years, and commission say further savings may be made.

Portland—Construction of cement drydock costing \$150,000 will be commenced here Jan. 1.

Portland—Financial control of Portland Flouring Mills Co., one of largest and oldest milling companies on the coast, passed from Wilcox estate to Max H. Houser, and several associates, last week.

One hundred twenty seven cars loads of fir lumber on government order shipped east and south from Oregon and Washington in one day.

Gardiner—Two fish canneries here employing women exclusively. Previously Chinese workers have been imported for canning season.

Portland—Construction of 500 winches, largest single order of character ever placed in Portland and probably on Pacific Coast, is to be undertaken by Helser Machine Works for Emergency Fleet Corporation.

Fishtrap—New shingle mill being erected here; capacity 100,000 shingles daily.

North Bend—Yainax, last boat of Hough type at Kruse & Banks yards, launched here.

Portland—War contracts to manufacture leather for army and artillery keep W. H. McMonies & Co. working maximum capacity with payroll of \$7,500 per month.

REMAINING SON WOUNDED

O. B. Gates has received word that his remaining son, Millard, was severely wounded in the Soissons Chateau-Thierry drive, July 20, when a piece of shrapnel struck him, breaking both bones in one of his legs. He was taken to the hospital at Orleans, and is doing nicely under the care of American doctors and nurses.

Millard's brother, Carroll, died from wounds received in an earlier American drive.

GUY EDSON, BUGLER, PROBABLY IS KILLED

Nephew, Atha Russell, Writes A. C. Shute, That he Hears of Death

NOTHING OFFICIAL HEARD

Was Volunteer in Company B, Third Oregon, Went to Mexico

A. C. Shute yesterday evening received a letter from Atha Russell, in France, that he had heard that his uncle, Guy Edson, son of Mrs. O. E. Edson, of this city, had been killed, and further stated that he believed this to be true, as he had heard nothing from him for some time. Edson was a bugler, and after reaching France had been detailed on wire work to connect communication lines.

Nothing official has yet been heard from the front, and there is a great possibility that the report is erroneous.

Young Edson was with the Oregon regiment at the Mexican border. He was in Company B, Third Oregon, and crossed last December when his company embarked from Camp Mills.

His mother resides in this city, and as the family has had no official communication, he may be alive. Wiring on the front is a hazardous piece of work, and the wireman is always subject to fire from the snipers.

Young Edson is a brother of Mrs. Russell and of Mrs. R. Belinger, of Forest Grove. Sergeant Russell evidently believes that the report is true, as indicated by his comment to Mr. Shute.

She leaves her husband, now residing at Nampa, and here for the funeral; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. The funeral took place this afternoon, Undertaker Donelson conducting the obsequies, and the service was held at the Blooming church.
