

WESTERN WALNUT ASS'N VISITS VALLEY POINTS

Inspect Groner Walnut Orchard, Largest in County

VISIT BIG FILBERT FIELD Call on Senator LaFollette at Wheatland Peach Orchard

Inspection of some of Oregon's walnut groves was conducted by the Western Walnut Association August 26-28. The committee in charge of the excursion left Portland in automobiles at 8 o'clock Monday morning, composed of the following walnut growers: E. W. Matthews, Anity; Knight Pearcey, Salem; Prof. C. L. Lewis, O. A. Co.; Chas. Trunk, Dundee; Ferd Groner, Hillsboro; M. McDonald, Oregon; W. W. Reburn, McMinnville; Phil Metcahan, Portland; and A. E. Wright, Portland.

Intimate talks by orchard owners and others qualified to speak were given at suitable times. The schedule included a visit to Ferd Groner's groves at Scholls Ferry, followed by dinner at Newberg. The Dundee orchards, oldest in Oregon, were inspected in the afternoon, supper and lodging at McMinnville. Tuesday morning the Kola Walnut grove, said to be the largest seedling tract in the world, the LaFollette Wheatland peach farm, and the Senator McNary walnut tract, were inspected before dinner at Salem. A longer trip by way of Skyline, Jefferson, and Albany, took up the afternoon, ending with a reception and dinner at Eugene. Next morning the visitors inspected the George Darris filbert grove, the largest bearing tract in America, and some of the other prize orchards of the district. The journey was concluded by way of Corvallis, Independence, Monmouth and Dallas districts, where some of the most successful groves are located.

The visit to the Ferd Groner walnut tracts was a revelation to many of the party. This holding promises in time to be the most valuable acreage in this section.

INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Portland—The first of 10 wooden bare hulls to be outfitted at the docks of the Willamette Iron & Steel Works are now being rushed out by Willamette company. Hulls are from Standifer shipyard at Vancouver.

Marshfield—Coos Bay shipyards show highest efficiency record of all the yards in U. S., according to government figures.

Toledo—Roberts will complete a new slab conveyor and puts in new planer.

Contracts for 33 wooden cargo vessels, each of 3,500 tons, seven wooden barges and three wooden harbor tugs, were let by U. S. Shipping Board. Six will be built by Kruse & Banks, North Bend, two each by Fulton Shipbuilding Co., Wilmington, Cal., the Seaborn Shipyards Co., Tacoma, the St. Hellen (Wash.) Shipbuilding Co., and Nilson & Kelez Shipbuilding Co., Seattle, and one by George F. Rodgers & Co., Astoria, Ore.

Lebanon cannery begins run on evergreen blackberries. Plant expects to handle about 300 tons of berries at 5 cents a pound this season.

Toledo—Work lively on the government mill site.

Bandon—Ownership of Bandon woolen mills taken over by E. N. Smith. Plant valued at approximately \$80,000, and consists of a mill which employs about 80 workers. Plans for extension of plant will be started immediately.

Port of Portland to build coal bunkers. \$75,000 dock for coaling ships to rise near elevators at St. Johns.

Oregon City—Hawley Pulp & Paper Co. is constructing 50,000 gallon reservoir for a reserve water supply for sprinkling system of the company.

Echo—Work started on Echo-Pendleton road.

Fort Rock—Co-operative creamery here completed; strats operations.

Eugene—A fir-cut log at Jack Bester logging camp on Siuslaw river sealed 26,000 feet. It was 90 feet in length and about six feet in diameter and straight and clear. Lumbermen stated that the log was probably worth \$500 in the water.
