HILLSBORO BOY TELLS OF GERMAN CAPTURE

Private Herbert L. Miller Kills German Who Hurlled Grenade

PAPER FOR A SOUVENIR

Would Like Christmas Dinner at Home But Doesn't Expect It

Private Herbert L. Miller, who was wounded several weeks ago was discharged from the base hospital and was again in action in July. Under date of July 29 he wrote his mother, Mrs. Geo. Tompkins:

"I have not written you for a month but it has not been my fault. I just got out of the hospital after being wounded, and went over the top again, but came out of it fine. You more than likely have read about the big Franco-American drive. Well, I was in that. We advanced about 10 miles on our sector.

This is German paper on which I am writing and you had better keep it as a souvenir. The German I got it off threw a hand grenade at me so I lifted the top of his head off with my Colt's .45. They are some gun. You can blow a hole in a man about as big as his fist. Then I took the guys stuff—a box of stationery, a .Luger revolver and a watch. We certainly run them for a goal, believe me. Well, I hope this is the turning point of the war. I would like to be home to eat a Christmas dinner, but I guess there isn't much chance of it. But you never can tell what will happen. It is certainly hot here. We are back in a rest camp now. Pretty soft, believe me. But it isn't soft when those machine gun bullets are whistling and that shrapnel bursting. But we're all doing our bit here. Well, this is an awful long letter for me to write, so I guess I will have to close, as it is about chow time. Yours with love, Herbert L. Miller, Co. L, 28th Inf., A. E. F."

MARINE DIES IN FRANCE

Donald J. Sutherland, aged 23, enlisted with the United States Marines, died June 18, from wounds received in action on the front in France. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Sutherland, of West Baseline, Hillsboro. He enlisted with the Marines six years ago, and volunteered May 8 for overseas service. He was sent to the front at once, having had several years of active service.

Prior to overseas service he was a recruiting sergeant stationed at St. Louis, Mo. He was but 17 years of age when he first joined the U. S. Marines.

When he received his wounds he was in the lead of one of the most gallant attacks during the first big American drive when the Germans were hurled back along the Chateau-Thierry line.

His parents have the sympathy of their many friends.

CLAUDE GRAY VICTIM OF SEVERE WOUNDS

Hillsboro Boy at Front Receives Injuries at Battle in France

EDSON REPORT UNCERTAIN

Family Thinks That Nephew's Conjecture May be Error

Claude Gray, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Gray, was injured in the American drive on the Toul front during July, and he was in the hospital at last reports, catalogued under the "severely wounded." Young Gray enlisted as a volunteer out of the High School contingent from this city, in the Spring of 1917, and went across to France last December, with the Third Oregon contingent. The latest advices say that he is doing nicely and will be out in several weeks.

The report of the possible death of Sergeant Guy Edson is still unconfirmed, and under the circumstances it is thought that the report was merely conjecture. Atha Russell, nephew of Edson, writes his relatives from France that he had not heard from Guy for some time, and that there might be something in the report there, of the casualty.

The many friends of these boys hope that both are all right.

WAS ON LEAVE

Corporal Elmer Batchelder, with the American army in France, writes his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Batchelder, under date of July 30:

"Am now at Aix Le Bains, now on my leave. Am having a fine time taking in the interesting sights. This is the most wonderful place I have ever seen, or expect to see. It is a famous health resort for people from all over the globe as well as a historical place. We stop here in the hotel and we are treated finely. The Y. M. C. A. here is located in a magnificent building. Before the war the building contained a casino or gambling place. Harry Shaw and Morgan and a few other of the U. S. rich often gambled here. The Y. M. C. A. secretaries plan the different sight seeing trips and also escort us to the places. I expect to go to see Mt. Blanc and the Italian Alps this afternoon. If I am not mistaken we have a picture of Mt. Blanc there at home, have we not? Tomorrow I go to Chambery. It is another famous resort. I have bought postal cards of all the places I have visited and will send them home. Also have kodak with me and will take some actual photographs. Think this will be the most interesting seven days I ever put in and only wish you both had the opportunity to be with me. If a fellow doesn't wish to take the trips the Y. M. C. A. alone here will give you ample amusement. Must cut my letter short as I am going on an excursion this p. m. so must hurry and get my dinner."

RUSSELL CARTER DEAD FROM BATTLE WOUND

Passed Away in France at Hospital About August 1

LEG CUT OFF AT THIGH

Was Son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. H. Carter, Hillsboro, and Aged 19

Russell Carter, aged 19 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. H. Carter, died in the base hospital in France, from loss of blood due to a wound received in the battle of Chateau Thierry, the right leg having been amputated at the thigh. Private Carter was born near Knoxville, Tenn., in July, 1899, and came to Hillsboro with his parents in 1903. He received his education in this city and when he enlisted as a volunteer was up to his senior year in Hillsboro High. He was a bright, affable boy, and when the call came to the colors in the Great War he determined to enlist. He was mustered into Company B, Third

Sanitarium, Portland, August 28, 1918, shortly before noon. Miss Carter had been ill for some months, but was thought to have been improving rapidly. The death of Miss Carter, coming the next day after the message arrived detailing the death of Russell Carter, the brother of the young lady, was a great blow to Mr. and Mrs. Carter. Leona was born in East Tennessee, Dec. 10, 1894, and came to Oregon with her parents in 1903. She was a member of the Hillsboro Baptist Church. She was deservedly popular in the younger circle, and has many friends who mourn her loss and sympathize with the bereaved family. Besides her parents, she leaves a half-brother, E. A. Larrance, a sister, Miss Addie, and brothers, Haskell, in France, and Earl and Conway Carter.

The funeral services will be held Sunday at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, at the Baptist Church, Rev. E. A. Smith conducting the obsequies.
