restaurants, hotels, lunch counters and eating rooms shall not be deemed the sale of merchandise under the terms of this resolution; and, provided, further, that the sale of gasoline, distillate and lubricating oil at garages and public filling stations, except in the supplying of motor trucks actually engaged directly or indirectly in war industries, shall be deemed the sale of merchandise, and subject to the terms and conditions of this resolution.

The ruling raised such a protest that the authorities finally put off the enforcement of the ruling until Oct. 7, and on Saturday of this week they again met in Portland to reconsider the matter of the order.

Portland is making one of the greatest outbursts against the order, claiming that the closing of the ice cream places after six, and their closing on Sundays, as well as the shutting up of the cigar stands, will leave no place whatever for the many soldiers who visit that city from Vancouver. It begins to look as though the order will be rescinded.

1st, That the granting clause in that certain deed, made, executed and delivered unto the plaintiff by John A. Lots 2 and 7, in block 4, Humphrey's addition to the town, now City, of Hillsboro, Oregon; also lots 1 and 2 of block 20, in Simmons addition to said town, now city, and also all of lots 3 and 4 of said block 20 that lies north of the right of way of the Oregon and California Railroad as now located and operated; and also including the ground marked as an alley on the plat of Simmons' Addition to Hillsboro, which said alley has been vacated by the Board of Trustees of said town, now city, of Hillsboro, Oregon, said alley being in said block 20" and that said deed be so reformed and corrected that a fee simple title therein and thereto shall be thereby conveyed by the said John A. Foote, unto the plaintiff.

WAR EMERGENCY COURSE AND CERTIFICATE

Oregon Normal School

Owing to the scarcity of teachers the Oregon Normal School will offer a War Emergency Course of 20 weeks outlined by the Supt. of Public Instruction. The course will begin with each of the terms commencing Nov. 16, 1918; Feb. 8, 1919; and April 12, 1919. The Supt. of Public Instruction will consider it equivalent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for a year. This Course will be open to those who have had two years or more of High School work or its equivalent and who are at least eighteen years of age.
