He crossed the plains with his parents in 1852, and the father took up a donation land claim close to where Newton now stands. Nate was raised near Hillsboro, and 45 years ago moved to Cornelius, where he has ever since made his home. His wife died five years ago. He leaves the following children to mourn his loss—Mrs. Seward, Mrs. Reed, John, Frank and Claude, Portland, and Mrs. Will Merrill, of Cornelius. Noland was a close observer, and had a fund of anecdotes of pioneer times that were always of interest. He was a natural wit, and in younger days was always the center of a group.
