President Wilson yesterday answered the last German note, and tells Germany that an armistice means surrender. HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

Hillsboro High now has a military company of fifty-three members. Lieutenant Perkins, of the Home Guard, has been chosen as drill master, by the school board, and accordingly he conducted the first drill last Monday afternoon. Thursday, Friday and Monday were the days set aside for enlistment, and during this time, the superintendent's office was turned into a recruiting office. The recruiting was in charge of Leo Goar, Chester Hanna, Chas. Buchanan and Arthur Reiling. These fellows, who dubbed themselves Recruiting Sergeants, succeeded in signing up fifty-three out of the sixty boys in school, and in three days, and they didn't have to run after them either. Each recruit is obliged to sign a pledge to attend all drills, unless prevented by sickness, and obey all commands of his officers.

Chas. Buchanan Jr., a student of H. H. S., enlisted in the U. S. Marine Corps last Monday, and left for Mare Island training station Wednesday morning. "Back" was treasurer of the Senior Class and a leader in all school activities, as well as being well "up" in all his studies. His many friends wish him all kinds of good luck and success.

The students held a rally last Friday at the noon assembly, and considerable enthusiasm concerning military training was manifested. Impromptu speeches, by members of the faculty and student body, were enjoyed by the assembly. Some of the Freshie speakers displayed almost human intelligence, at times.

Arthur Sorenson, who had a light attack of Spanish Flu, or some other malady akin to it, returned to school Monday.

School was obliged to close Wednesday morning, on account of the influenza, and will remain so until all danger is past.

The worth of a pure-bred bull as a herd sire is strikingly shown in a report of the results of experiments upon a scrub herd by the Iowa Experiment Station. Prof. L. S. Gillette in the October issue of the "Agricultural Student" sets forth the remarkable results of the test.

Pure-bred bulls were mated with scrub cows and the resulting heifers were bred back to approved bulls of the same breed as their sires.
